Coquille-North Bend Stage Show; Loggers Win SWO Diamond Fiasco, 11-0

The Coquille Loggers out-hit, out-ran and showed a greater inclination to stay-out-in-the-rain longer than their North Bend rivals when the two clubs met at North Bend last Thursday night. Consequently, Fortier's doughty Loggers chalked up victory number two for the season by a score of 11-0.

Farical aspects of the "now-you-see-it, now-you-don't" ball game cropped up several times during the evening. The first occurred when the game was held up for twenty-nine minutes during the fifth inning when a heavy drizzle almost postponed the already once-postponed contest. However, play was eventually continued and the comedy lingered on.

The game became a riot of laughs during the latter part of the fifth as the Loggers tried to end the inning, thereby making the game official in the record book while North Bend went to fantastic lengths to keep the game going.

At one point, Logger White laid down a roller to the North Bend pitcher who slowly picked up the ball, gently tossing it to first baseman Arlitt who idly followed White to first. White then sauntered down to second, then to third and finally loped home. The North Benders meanwhile, ignored him completely. However, White was ordered back to first by Umpire Shaw who pointed out that the ball was dead, time out having been called.

Coquille finally did end the wet and stormy inning by deliberately fanning out, a move that brought an additional storm, this one from the North Bend roofers.

One more burst of activity did occur, even after the foregoing added attractions. It happened in the sixth when a balk was called against North Bend pitcher Larry O'Dell. Immediately Manager Howard Hazzard protested the game in spite of the fact that Coquille was leading 8-0 at the time. If the protest is subsequently upheld by the league, the game will be replayed from that point.

As for the game itself, Coquille scored one run in the second, four in the third, three in the fourth and one each in the sixth, seventh and eighth.

North Bend used three pitchers, O'Dell, Hunt and Costello, in an effort to solve the potency of the Coquille bats. Hunt was knocked out of the box in the second and O'Dell followed him in the seventh.

Don White opened the evening's festivities for the Loggers and gave way to relief pitcher Hub West in the eighth. White gave up three scratch singles while West blanked the North Benders during the two innings. White is credited with two strike-outs. West whiffed three.

Fred Toal, Logger centerfielder, set the pace for the Coquille lads by blasting two doubles and a triple in four times at the plate.

The entire Logger ball club played heads up ball all the way, committing one error to North Bend's five; while the hitting power of Toal, Goodman, Douglas, Salisbury, Marchand, Forkner, and Stuart was just too much for North Bend.

Coquille Loggers Smother Coos Bay As Hub West Pitches Shutout 16-0

Hub West, veteran relief pitcher of the Coquille Loggers, helped himself to a shut-out victory by allowing four singles while his team-mates were blasting thirteen hits for sixteen runs, all at the expense of the Coos Bay edition of the Southwestern Oregon baseball league last Sunday at Fortier Field.

West showed vast improvement over last year in accounting for eleven strike-outs during the game without giving up a single walk.

The blasting bats of the Fortier-men put the game on ice in the top half of the first inning when six hits coupled with four walks and four Coos Bay errors sent ten Loggers romping home. Six stolen bases during the frame did not improve the outlook for the befuddled Coos Bay nine.

Douglas led off the batting spree by drawing a walk and was followed by a blistering single off the bat of Joe Marchand. Douglas, who had already gone to second on an error, came home on Marchand's hit.

Al Forkner, third man to face pitcher Vincent, sent a slow roller down the first base line and was thrown out, Marchand going to third after having stolen second. Steinberg then drew a walk, and Marchand stole home with the second Coquille run.

Bob Stewart, Logger second baseman, singled, sending Steinberg to second. Toal then drove a hard ball into centerfield and was safe at first on a fielders' choice. The fielder elected to throw to third in an effort to cut off Steinberg but the throw was wild and Steinberg came home with the third run of the inning, while Toal toddled on down to second.

Mary Goodman, Logger left-fielder, drove one through the shortstop who bobbed the ball, scoring Toal, with Stewart going to second on the play. Seconds later he stole third while Goodman stole second. A wild throw by the pitcher sent Stewart on home while Goodman went to third.

Tommy Hawkins followed all this with a walk while Goodman completed the fifth steal of the inning by coming home.

Pitcher Hub West, the next man to face Vincent, was thrown out second to first. Then Dave Doug-

las, coming to the plate for the second time in the first inning, pounded out a hard single to score Hawkins. Marchand followed with another single, his second of the day and Al Forkner blasted a terrific three-bagger to score Douglas and Marchand. Steinberg drew a walk as Forkner stole home with the tenth run, and Stewart was thrown out second to first to retire the side.

The Loggers added four more runs in the second inning on singles by Goodman and Salisbury, three walks and two Coos Bay errors.

Coquille coasted the rest of the way picking up one run on two hits in the fifth and one more in the seventh.

Coos Bay used two pitchers, Vincen and Hess, in a futile effort to put out the fire. Vincen was relieved after pitching to three men in the second. Vincen gave up four walks. Hess gave up eleven, and struck out two men.

Loggers Unseat Unbeaten Roseburg White Pitches Four Hit Game to Win 5-2

Coquille's powerful Loggers traveled all the way to Roseburg Tuesday evening, June 27th, to meet a team that had not previously been defeated in eleven starts. But when the lights were dimmed later in the evening on the Roseburg diamond, the hard-playing charges of Bill Fortier had a 5-2 decision over the vaunted Roseburg nine.

Don White pitched the entire nine frames for the Loggers, allowing four hits and striking out eleven batters. White gave up one lone walk.

Roseburg opened the scoring in the first inning on a double by Baker. It was the only hit of the inning but the score came on the end of a long sacrifice fly to centerfield.

The Loggers came back in the second to tie the score on a blistering triple by catcher Tommy Hawkins. The long-hit ball scored Toal who had gained first when the Roseburg shortstop fumbled a hard-hit grounder.

Neither team scored in the third, but the Loggers started to move again in the fourth. Three runs crossed the plate on three walks, two stolen bases and five Roseburg errors.

That ended the scoring for both

teams until the ninth inning when the Loggers added one more on three walks, two stolen bases and one Roseburg error.

Roseburg collected her final tally on a bases-clear home-run by Smith, centerfielder. Smith took batting honors for Roseburg with two hits in four trips to the plate.

Outstanding fielding play was made by Larry Herns, Logger left-fielder, who made two brilliant catches. One, for which Herns went back to the fence and leaped high into the air to snag, was earmarked for a sure home-run.

Herns, who recently joined the Loggers as a utility outfielder, is a variety star on the University of Washington team. He is rated as a formidable hitter as well as an above-average outfielder.

Two more big runs were added to the Coquille total in the fifth and a big sixth inning produced six hits for five more runs to put the game on ice.

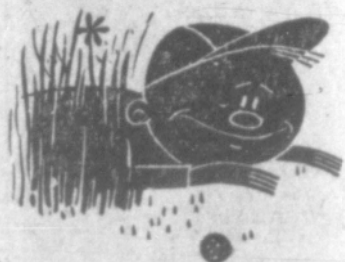
