

Huge Barge Load Of Fir Peelers Leave Bandon

The first of 260,000 feet of Coos and Curry county peeler logs left Bandon this week for the Herrington Milling company of Tacoma in what will be a barge a week shipping operation for the Washington mill.

A tug and barge from Portland took the first load out which was destined for Tillamook, Oregon, and the plywood plant there. Capacity of each barge is 350,000 feet.

The Herrington company stores the peelers at a log dump east of the Bullards ferry.

Bandon Substation Bids Invited

The Bonneville Power administration today called for bids on Invitation No. 5248 for the construction of the Bandon substation.

Bids are scheduled to be opened in Portland July 13 and according to the specifications the successful contractor will have 60 calendar days to complete the work.

The Bandon substation will be located just outside the southeast city limits of the city of Bandon. The substation will be connected to the McKinley - Bandon 115 kv transmission line and will ultimately provide service connections for the municipal power system of the city of Bandon and the Coos-Curry Electric Cooperative.
