Front St. Traffic Solution Appears

"It isn't going to happen!" Parking will continue on the south side of Front street despite the vote of the city to adopt a resolution of Councilman George Burr's to cancel parking on the south side of that thoroughfare in the interest of safety.

At a special council meeting Monday night Mayor Ray Jeub and the council agreed to a proposal submitted by Furniture dealer George Brooks to make a zoned area for truck loading and unloading in the middle of the block between Taylor and Willard, and to leave the balance of the street metered.

Support to the project came from Councilman Claude Mason who said he had voted for the other measure with the understanding that the north side of the street was to be affected.

Appearing before the council was a large group of Front street businessmen including Dennis Winn, Fred Bechill, Glenn Story, Chuck Adams, Ralph Flannery, George Brooks and Jack Bevin.

Traffic Danger During Holidays Object Of Warning

Oregonians will be bucking the worst traffic dangers of the year during the Fourth of July holiday week-end, Governor Douglas McKay and Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry warned today.

In a joint plea, both officials called on all motorists to cancel the rush and hurry in plans for out-of-town trips as the big week-end nears.

"Allow plenty of time to reach your destination without hurrying," the governor and secretary suggested. "Traffic will be too heavy for even momentary chance-taking."

Adding to the hazard of heavy traffic is the fact that the state's motor vehicle deaths are already exceeding those recorded last year at this time. Three out of four take place on the open highways, statewide records reveal. Loss of control and collisions at high speed are noted most frequently on fatal accident reports.

H. G. Maison, superintendent of

state police, says all major arterial highways will receive extra patrol during the week-end in an effort to hold accidents to a minimum. Meanwhile, vacationing tourists were being urged to stay off the roads, if possible, during the holiday.

Officials offered this tip as the best means for offsetting the traffic danger—"Get an early start on a short trip, and take it easy all the way."

An estimated 36 million vehicles will be jamming the streets and highways throughout the nation. For many, the holiday will last four days.
