Did you know that Angel Food cakes will freeze very well and will seem even more tender after freezing. Bake a number of them when eggs are plentiful. They can reappear as birthday cakes throughout the year.

Why not have planned leftovers—that is, if you have a home freezer. It's easier to double a recipe than to make it twice. Consequently, freezer owners figure on leftovers, often called "planned-overs." It is gratifying to know that you can pull a whole cooked meal from the freezer on a busy day, or when unexpected guests put in an appearance.

Believe it or not, a boiled egg should never be boiled. Simmering produces tastier, better results. The same is also true of hard-boiled eggs.

Stale, dried-up cheese turns into a delicious spread when placed into the meat grinder with chunks of raw onion.

Did you know that old eggs are smooth and shiny. Fresh eggs are rough and chalky in appearance.

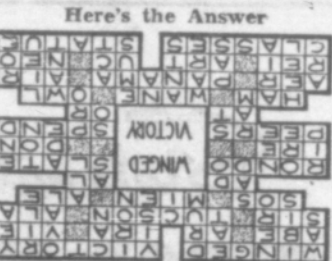
