Did you know that a graham-cracker pie shell, or other crumb pie shell, will be more attractive if you firm it down into the plate by pressing a slightly smaller pie plate upon it. Rotate the smaller plate lightly before removing, so it will come up clean.

When making drop cookies, dip up the dough with a standard tablespoon measure. Dip the measuring spoon in cold water before putting it into the dough each time. Dough falls out easily, flat side down, on the cookie sheet—and your cookies will all be the same size and same shape.

Strain jelly in the milk strainer with two filter disks, and jelly will be clear. No messy jelly bag to clean.

Shell corn for canning by putting small end of cob in the hole of the funnel of a tube cake pan. As you cut, kernels fall into cake pan.

"Cream Cornstarch Famous Lemon Pie"

Mix 3 tablespoons of cream corn starch with 1 1/2 cups of sugar. Cover with grated rind and juice of 1 1/2 lemons.

Add beaten egg yolks of 3 eggs and 1 1/2 cups boiling water.

Cook until thick. Pour into baked pie shell, cover with meringue and brown in a moderate oven.

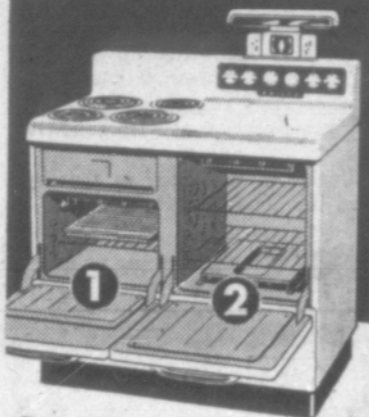
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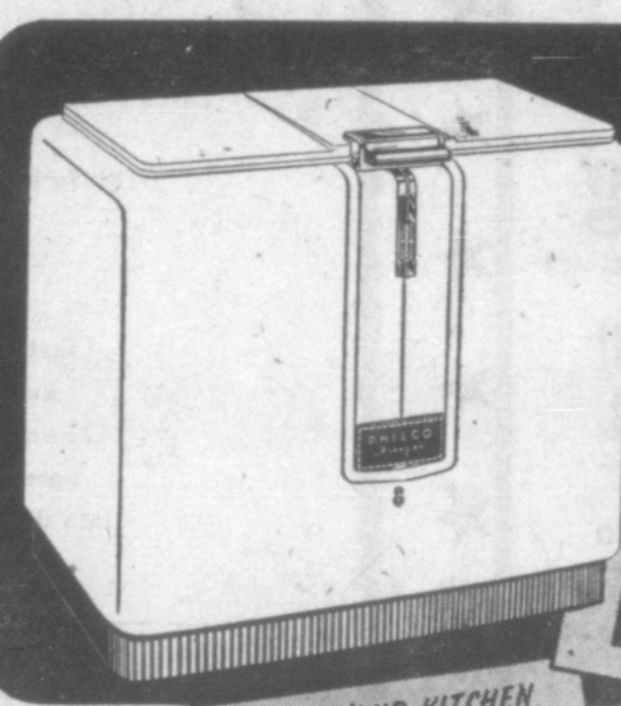
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
