## Powers Fund Hits Half-Way Mark For Resuscitator

About half of the near \$600 cost of the resuscitator purchased by the Powers Lions club has been raised.

One of the donations came from Mr. and Mrs. Burlie Forrest of Anaheim, California, who lost their small son, Ivan, in the drowning tragedy about three weeks ago.

Mayor Harold Ross, who wrote the parents expressing the sorrow of the townspeople of the accident which happened here, received a letter from Mrs. Forrest in acknowledgment of the letter and flowers which had been sent, and stating they would like a part in buying the resuscitator.

Thursday night members of the Lions club and interested townspeople gathered at the Lions den to see a demonstration of the E. N. J. portable resuscitator, bought by the Lions club, with the help of individuals and organizations. A patient 100 feet, or more from the machine can be treated; and the apparatus is useful for drowning, drug poisoning, asphyxia of newborn babies, as well as for hospital emergencies and neighborhood accidents. The machine is adaptable for babies, children and adults through its various mouth adapters.

It is mounted on its own carrying case and can be operated in any position, and extension hoses can reach patients up poles, under vehicles and other inaccessible places. If dual attachments are provided several patients can be treated at the same time. The case will be mounted on the local fire engine, ready for emergency use. It is on display at Sheedy's drug store. A donation will be gratefully received from anyone interested.
