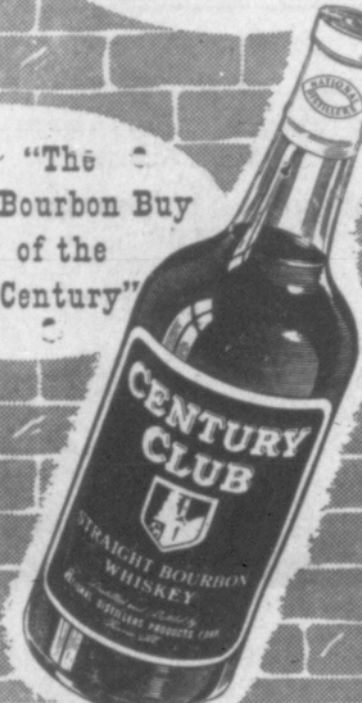
Another new cheese product is being produced commercially. It is made from a blend of creamy butter, Roquefort-type cheese, spices and condiments.

SCIENCE SAVES "BARREN" COWS

Many a good cow that the owner thought was barren has been sent to slaughter carrying a living, unborn calf.

If the owner doubts whether a cow is with calf, it is always a

good idea to have the animal examined by a veterinarian, before shipping to slaughter.

Sometimes pregnant cows come into heat because of a minor imbalance of the hormone glands. Several other factors enter into

mistaken judgments on whether a cow is pregnant or not.

Within the past ten years notable advancements have been made by veterinary science in the treatment of non-breeding cows.

For example, one common type of sterility caused by a low grade infection, responds to penicillin therapy. Another type, due to cystitis, may be corrected by a specific gland extract. Sterility due to trichomonads or to retained yellow bodies, is curable in some cases.

Sometimes a fairly simple surgical operation will make it possible for a cow to reproduce.

Feed, also, plays a big part in cattle reproduction. An animal may look all right, but due to an unbalanced ration may be suffering a vitamin deficiency. In some cases, veterinarians have used vitamin injections to restore an animal's fertility.

Before discarding any cow thought to be barren as a defective breeder it is a good investment to have skilled assistance in making the decision. A good breeding animal is worth more than a slaughter cow.

pendent growers as those to take advantage of the sale. The price offered and accepted by the managers of the pool was 64% cents for staple wool and 50% cents per pound for lamb wool, f.o.b. the nearest shipping point.

This is at least six cents more per pound than the price being paid for wool from any other section of the Western states and is limited to Curry county wool, no outside wool being accepted at these prices.

The sale involves from 100,000 to 150,000 pounds of wool, and the entire quantity is to be manufactured into special yarns by the Oregon Worsted mills, the Curry county product being the only wool obtainable in the United States suitable for this special purpose, as it is of a long and strong staple with slight shrinking quality. The buyer stated that the only wool obtainable in the world of like quality is that from Brisbane, Australia.

Sheep losses in this section during the last winter were fairly heavy, but it is believed the prospect of top prices in the future, now that the superior quality of Curry wool is recognized, will be an inducement for growers to increase production.

Curry County Wool Sale Brings High Prices This Month

A bid of 64% cents was accepted by a group of wool growers in Curry county, according to O. P. Ferguson, Gold Beach. The lambs wool will bring a little over 50c per pound and the sale was made to Blue Mountain Hide and Wool company of Portland. Three buyers submitted bids but failed to meet the requirements of the growers.

Sacks and fleece twine will be furnished at no cost to the growers. This price is net and will be weighed in at Gold Beach. Approximately 100,000 pounds of quarter, low quarter and braid wool is included in this sale.

Another pool of 150,000 pounds has been consigned to the Pacific Wool Growers to be sold on a graded basis. R. G. McKenzie, one of the directors, expects a little more out of this pool as a large part of it has already been contracted at very attractive prices.

A few independent growers contracted to sell early at 52c. A few small flocks are being shown at this time but most wool will be shown in July.

Wool Sale A Success
The Wool Sale at Portland, May 22 and 23 was undoubtedly a real success. Clean prices were approximately as follows: Fine Wool, \$1.65 to \$1.70; 1/4 Blood, \$1.40 to \$1.45; 3/4 Blood, \$1.25 to \$1.40; 1/2 Blood, \$1.20.

The highest grease price of 68% was received for an Idaho original bag, fine wool clip. Many lots of 3/4 and 1/2 Blood brought between 60c and 65c, Portland. Three Portland handlers participated in the sale and total offerings were around a million and a quarter pounds. One handler offered an additional 600,000 pounds that were yet to be received.

Twenty-Five Buyers Registered
Buyers registered represented the leading manufacturers, topmakers and handlers from the East as well as the manufacturers and handlers from the Portland area. Portland manufacturers purchased a good percentage of the offerings.

Growers Attend Sale
It was estimated that around fifty growers from Oregon, Washington and Idaho attended the sale. It is planned that this sale will become an Annual event. It is quite likely that the sale will be set back another two weeks in order to accommodate some of the later shearers.

There was considerable discussion among some of the growers as to the type of sale they would like to have. Quite a few suggested an auction where the bids are out in the open. Sales during the past two years have been "Sealed Bid Sales," and the buyers have required that the bids not be made public.

The next sale will probably be around June 1, 1951. Scheduled Sales Reflect The Demand

The Australians long ago realized that scheduled auction sales bring out the best that there is in the market. In fact, the greater bulk of the wools of the world go to market by way of auction or Sealed Bid Sales. The Southern Hemisphere auction sales bring buyers from all over the world. In our Western country, especially in Portland, growers could develop either wool auctions or Sealed Bid Sales that would be outstanding events. By and large, the buyers like to purchase wool in this manner. Portland is a natural for wool sales because we have the local manufacturers here to compete with the Middle Western and Eastern manufacturers for their needs.

Tractor Care To Get Attention Of Oregon 4-H Clubs

A good many Oregon farm tractors are receiving more than the customary attention this year.

Oregon's newest 4-H club project, tractor maintenance, has attracted more than 200 youngsters who are enrolled in 25 clubs, located in 18 counties, reports L. J. Allen, state 4-H club leader. The project, new this year in five western states including Oregon, is under the sponsorship of the General Petroleum corporation of Los Angeles.

Union county leads the state with four clubs having a total enrollment of 29 club members.

The project includes tractor maintenance rather than repair and has the intention of acquainting 4-H club members with practices in maintaining and operating tractors skillfully and safely. Before the close of the club year this fall, several counties plan contests in maintenance and handling.

To the state's most outstanding 1950 tractor maintenance club member, the General Petroleum corporation will award an all-expense trip to 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. Announcement of the award will be made in October when winners of all state contests are named, Allen states.

On a county basis, tractor maintenance project club members will also be rated at the close of the club year. Those club members rating in the blue or top group will each receive a sterling medal.

At 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, eight state tractor maintenance winners will receive college scholarships valued at \$300 each. The project is nationwide.

In five western states, the General Petroleum corporation provides funds for leader training, awards, and instructional kits which are issued through the state 4-H club offices.

Dairy Prices Slip During Past Month

Of the nation's livestock and livestock products, dairy products are the only commodities which made price declines during the 30 day period ending June 15, according to the weekly dairy markets review prepared by the OSC extension service from USDA reports and other data. All other livestock commodities, that is, meat animals, poultry and eggs, and wool, show unchanged to higher price trends.

Both the average price received by farmers for butterfat and milk at wholesale, made further reductions during this period. The average price of butterfat at mid-June was 59.7 cents a pound for the nation as a whole. This is the lowest average farm price of any time this year. However, it is a trace higher than a year ago at mid-June.

The average farm price of milk throughout the nation continued further seasonal declines in price during the month up to June 15. The average price dropped around five cents a hundredweight. The whole milk price is, on the other hand, below a year ago. The drop is nearly 16 cents a hundredweight. The average price of milk received by the nation's farmers at mid-June is the lowest of any time since May 1946.

The average price of dairy cows throughout the nation has shown month since the recent low price in August 1949. The advance during the 30 day period ending June 15 was \$6 a head. This is the highest monthly advance during the past year. The average June price is also well above a year earlier at the same time. The nation's farm-

ers received an average of \$197 for a dairy cow on June 15. This is \$14 higher than a year ago in June. It is also the highest average price received for dairy cows since September 1948.

Cow values advanced in all regions of the United States during this period. The highest advance was in the North Atlantic states, where the average value of a dairy cow received by farmers stepped up \$11 a head. This compares with a \$7 advance for the average of the three coast states.

California, however, leads the nation in the value received by

farmers for dairy cows. The average price of a dairy cow in California at mid-June was \$240 a head. Some New England states ranged at \$232 to \$235 a head. In Wisconsin, the average price of a dairy cow at mid-June was \$235.

Utah is the next high state on the west coast, where dairy cows averaged \$210 during June. The average value in Washington was \$178. Oregon has the lowest average cow value received by farmers at mid-June of any of the western states. The average price was \$160 a head, being fully \$80 under the high state, California.
