Coos Health Group Reports 4,026 T.B. X-Rays

The Coos County Tuberculosis and Health association held its regularly scheduled monthly meeting in Coquille last Wednesday, at which time Mrs. W. G. Barrow, executive-secretary, announced that 4,026 x-rays were taken by the mobile unit when here in June. This figure is county-wide.

Eye-glasses were purchased for a penniless tubercular patient now at Salem, which is in line with the organization's rehabilitation program.

Mrs. Barrow and Mrs. Harold Stevens, Coos Bay, Health Education chairman, are now in Corvallis attending Institute, an annual meeting for all individuals interested in the education, care and control of tuberculosis.

Seventeen cases of tuberculosis have been found in Coos county for the period January 1, through May 31st.

Members attending the meeting voted a membership fee of 25c. All persons interested in the work of the association are invited to join. Information pertaining to this can be had by contacting Mrs. W. G.

Barrow in Coos Bay, or Mrs. Harvey Benham here in Coquille. The next meeting will be held in Coos Bay September 13, at the association's new office in the Hub building.

Marines Want Lists Of Recruits

The local Marine Corps recruiting office revealed today that they have been assigned unlimited quotas for the Marine Corps enlistees.

Colonel W. F. Parks, officer in charge of the Western Marine Corps recruiting Division, said that he had been authorized to take in as many men as he could until told to stop.

The Colonel further stated, "Our requirements for enlistment have not changed and we are not looking for any particular specialists. We are just as interested in the raw recruit as the veteran or reservist."

There was no indication as to how much the Marine Corps plans to expand. With a present strength of about 74,000 they have been directed to attain sufficient numbers to carry out their mission within an authorized strength of approximately 100,000.

Juvenile Grange Members Urged On Summer Camp

Juvenile Grange members from all over the state will assemble at the Skyliner camp, 12 miles west of Bend, August 1-6th, for their annual State Grange summer camp. Any Juvenile grange member, 10 years of age or over, is eligible to attend the camp. The fee for the five day period is \$9.

Classes in handicrafts, wood-working, and First Aid, as well as hiking, swimming and planned recreation are offered, with an evening of Grange demonstration work, lecture program and recreation completing the day.

Campers supply necessary clothing, toilet articles and bedding. Cots and mattresses are furnished, with all campers sleeping in tents. A fine lodge, houses the kitchen and dining rooms.

Juvenile Granges are urged to see that their Grange is represented at camp.

Applications for camp must be sent to Mrs. Helen Roberts, Reedsport, Ore., by July 25th. Mrs. Roberts will have charge of the summer camp program this year.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the legal voters of School District No. 8C, Coos County, State of Oregon, that a SCHOOL ELECTION of said district will be held at Washington School on the 26th day of July, 1950, between the hours of 2:00 o'clock and 8:00 o'clock p. m. Standard Time or 3:00 o'clock and 9:00 o'clock p. m. Daylight-Saving Time for the purpose of voting on the budget for the fiscal school year, beginning July 1, 1950 and ending June 30, 1951, hereinafter set forth, and to vote on the proposition of levying a district tax which will exceed the 6% limitation as set by law. An open hearing to discuss said budget will be held at Washington School at 8:00 o'clock p. m. Standard Time or 9:00 o'clock p. m. Daylight-Saving Time on the same day.
