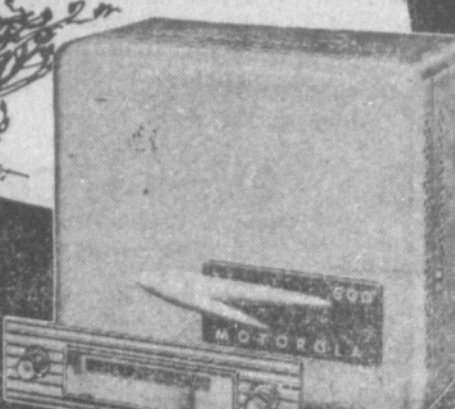

County Sells Big Timber Tracts

More than \$270,000 worth of timber and land was sold by the Coos county court Friday and Monday to Coos county logging companies.

The largest sale was a \$230,000 tract to the Evans Products company. The sale was the E 1/2 S 1/2 NW 1/4 and NE 1/4 SW 1/4 of section 20, township 31, range 12. The county foreclosed on this property in 1939 when about \$1,200 taxes were due. If this delinquent tax had been paid and all other taxes paid up to the present, the county would have received only \$4,500 on the property. It was sold at the appraised price of \$230,000.

The timber only on the NE 1/4 NE 1/4 of section 35, township 32, range 11, 40 acres was sold at the appraised price of \$21,500 to the Cape Arago Lumber company.

These two tracts had previously been advertised for sale on sealed bids but were not sold.

Sold on sealed bids Monday were tracts to Albert Powers, Coos Bay, and James McWilliams, Jr., Gaylord.

Powers bid \$2,751 for an undivided one-half interest in the NE 1/4 and an undivided 7-12 interest in the SE 1/4 of section 28, township 31, range 12. Powers already owned the other interests in the tracts. The appraised price was \$2,750.

McWilliams bid \$6,640, as compared to the appraised price of \$5,000, for the S 1/2 SE 1/2 section 3-, township 30, range 12, and lot 2, section 6, township 31, range 12.

Swim School Sign-Up Continues

The busiest desk in Coquille this week is the registration desk for the Red Cross Swimming classes which are scheduled for July 31 to August 11 at Sugar Loaf pool.

Wives of the Coquille Active club members are in charge of the registration at the Coquille hotel each afternoon until Friday, or until the quota of one hundred registrations have been made. Sixty-one children were signed up the first day.

Instructors for the classes will be Laura Lee Garret of Coos Bay, Patty Shaw and Joe Berg of Coquille. Children over eight years are eligible for one of the three class divisions, beginners, and intermediate swimmers and junior life-savers. The charge for bus transportation will be \$3. (Those who paid \$4 for transportation will receive \$1 refund at the registration desk).

Active club chairman in charge of the swim class arrangements is Alex Kreick.

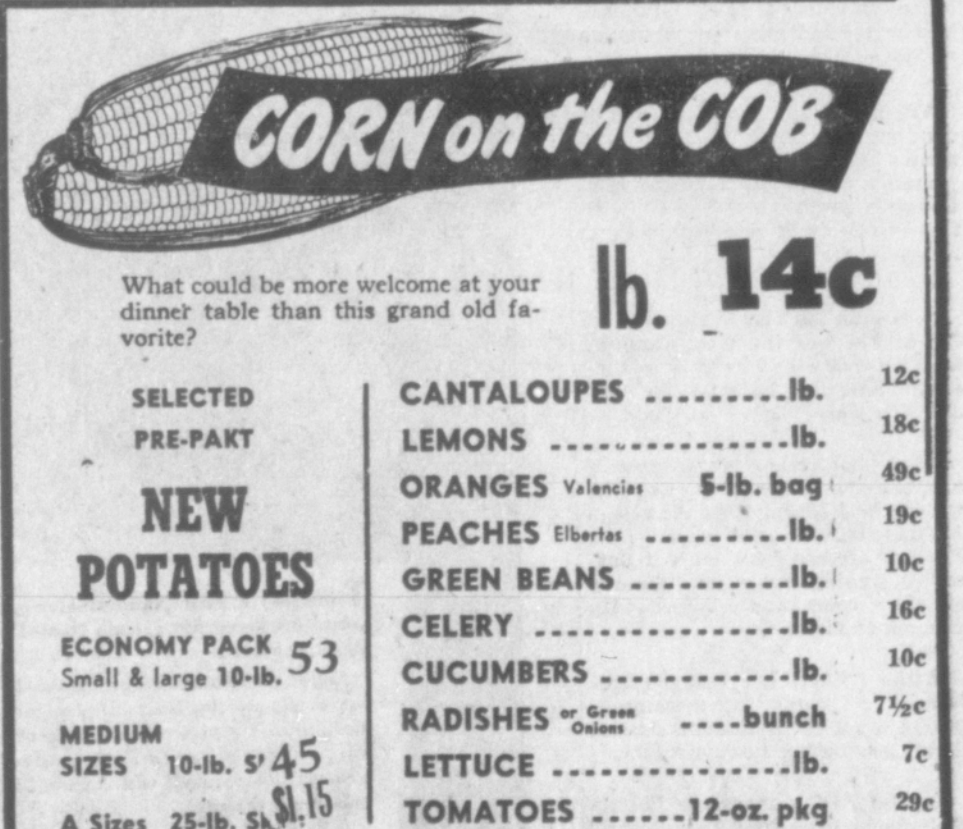
