Mrs. Mable Ellis, an aunt of the groom whose home is in England, assisted at the reception held in the church parlours.

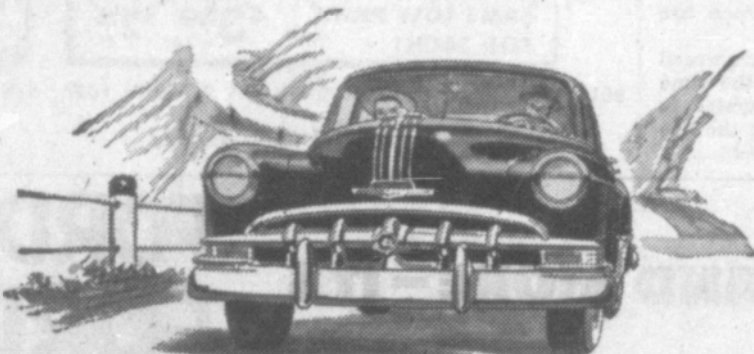

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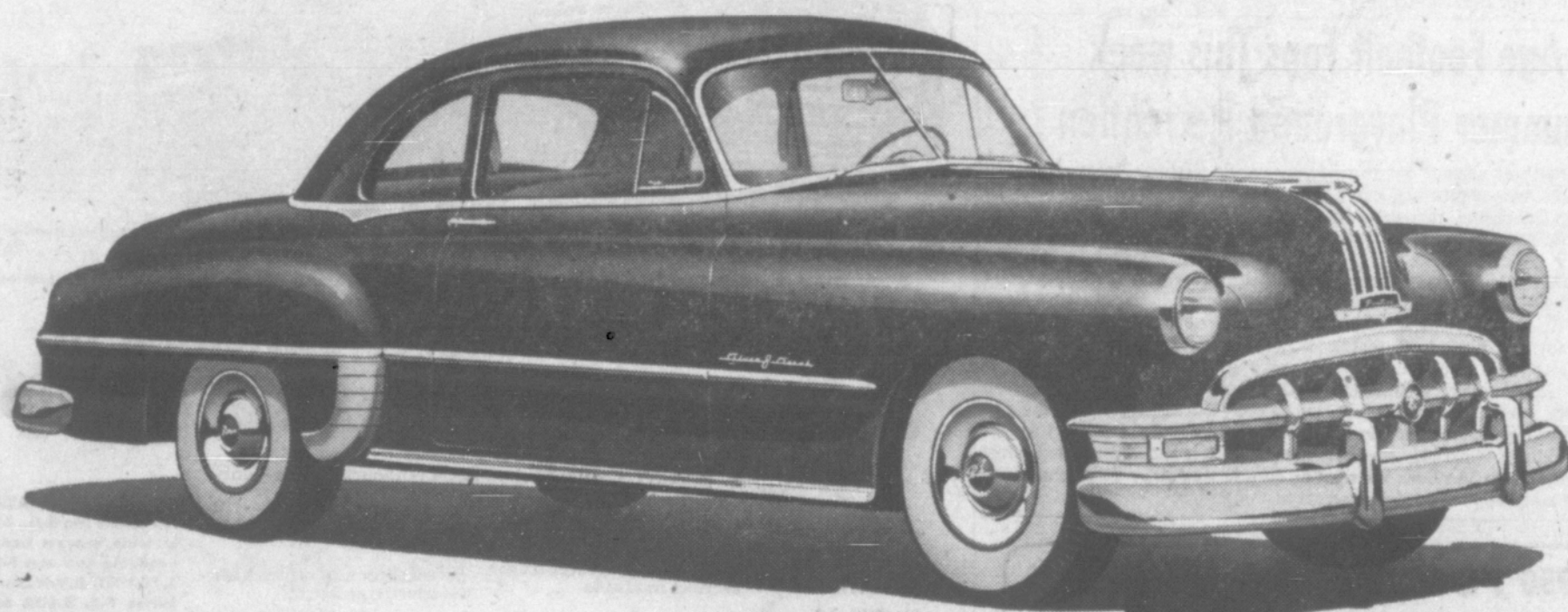
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
