

Boundary? Said Illegal

No action has been taken by the district boundary board in connection with a petition for a change of boundary between the Randolph and Riverton school districts, because the district attorney ruled

the proceedings illegal.

The policy of the board as outlined at a meeting of the group Monday was to avoid interference with any consolidation voted by the people where such changes are based solely on a possible difference in tax levies. The board will give consideration on changes in boundary of voted consolidations only if a glaring injustice exists affecting the welfare of the school children.

Land Exchange Completed

One more land exchange has been completed involving O and C lands in the grazing area in Coos county. Mr. Charles V. Guerin of Myrtle Point has received title to eighty (80) acres of O and C land described as the E 1/2 SE 1/4, section 15, T 28 S., R. 12 W., according to Ross A. Youngblood, District Forester of the Coos Bay Forest District. The Bureau of Land Management obtained equal value of lands offered by Mr. Guerin, with these lands being in the forested area of the East Fork Coquille river drainage.

In fiscal year 1950 exchanges effecting grazing lands totaled 10 completed cases, involving some 1880 acres of BIM property. It is also reported from the Coos Bay BIM District office that eleven exchanges are pending in the BIM Washington, D. C., office on which favorable action is expected before the turn of the year.

One thing that has slowed down the consummation of land exchanges, reported District Forester Youngblood, is the matter of submitting improper titles by the exchangers. In some cases, exchanges have been held up due to the necessity of withdrawing water site reservations and similar classifications made many years previous. Some BLM lands yet remain in the grazing area which are available for disposal by exchange.
