Chocolate Sundae Pie will make a hit with Dad and the youngsters.

Chocolate Sundae Pie
(Makes 1 9-inch pie)
1 Tbsp. (one envelope) unflavored gelatin
¾ cup cold water
3 slightly beaten egg yolks
½ cup sugar
¼ tsp. salt
1 cup milk, scalded
1½ tsp. vanilla
3 stiffly beaten egg whites
1 cup heavy cream, whipped
1 one-ounce square chocolate, silvered

Soften gelatin in cold water. Combine egg yolks, sugar and salt; slowly add milk. Cook in double boiler until mixture coats spoon. Add softened gelatin; stir until dissolved. Cool; add vanilla. Fold in egg whites and cream. Pour into Chocolate-Crust; Blend 1½ cups chocolate; wafer crumbs (about 20 wafers) with ½ cup melted butter. Press in 9 inch pie pan.

Raspberry Ice Cream Pie
(Makes 1 9-inch pie)
1 package raspberry flavored gelatin
One two thirds cups hot water
1 9-inch pastry shell
1 Tbsp. lemon juice
1 pint Vanilla ice cream
1 cup crushed raspberries
Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add

lemon juice; chill until partially set. Beat ice cream into gelatin. Fold in raspberries. Pour chilled filling into cool, 9-inch, baked pie shell. Chill the pie until firm, about 1 hour. Top with a fluff of whipped berries.

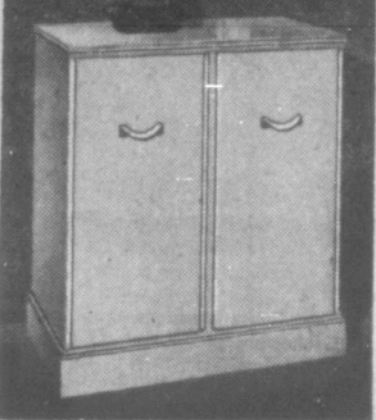
