Loggers Blast North Bend 7-3 As West Muffles Big Bats With Four Hits

Except for the first two innings when he gave up three hits for three runs, Hub West pitched near-perfect ball against North Bend Sunday as the Loggers blasted their way to their third straight win over the Bay club by a score of 7-3. West gave up four hits in the entire game.

North Bend jumped into a temporary lead when a single and a double combined to score the first run in the top of the first inning. Two more came in during the second inning, the products of a single and two Coquille errors.

The Loggers finally hit their stride in the third. West started the drive with a single and advanced to second when Dave Douglas drew a walk. Then hard-hitting Joe Marchand collected a triple to score both runners. Joe was left on third, however, as Al Forkner flied out to retire the side.

Still trailing by one run, Coquille came to bat in the bottom half of the fifth determined to even the count. Tommy Hawkins led off with a single, and West sacrificed him to second. And then it happened . . . a smashing home run over the right field fence off the bat of Dave Douglas brought two more Loggers home and put Coquille in the lead to stay.

The "coup de grace" for North Bend was brought about in the seventh when the Loggers staged another rally and collected three more runs on three hits.

Hub West, catching his second hit of the day, led off with a double and came home when Dave Douglas did the same thing, his second extra base hit in a row. Joe Marchand then singled to score Douglas. Forkner hit a long sacrifice fly, advancing Marchand to second. Marchand went to third and Stewart was safe at first when Holland, North Bend third baseman, bobbled the ball. Steinberg then drew a walk to fill the bases and Marchand came home on Toal's sacrifice. Hems then flied out to centerfield to retire the side and end the scoring for the day.

In pitching four-hit ball, West struck out four and gave up one walk.

Aune, North Bend hurler, gave up eight hits, struck out five and walked three.

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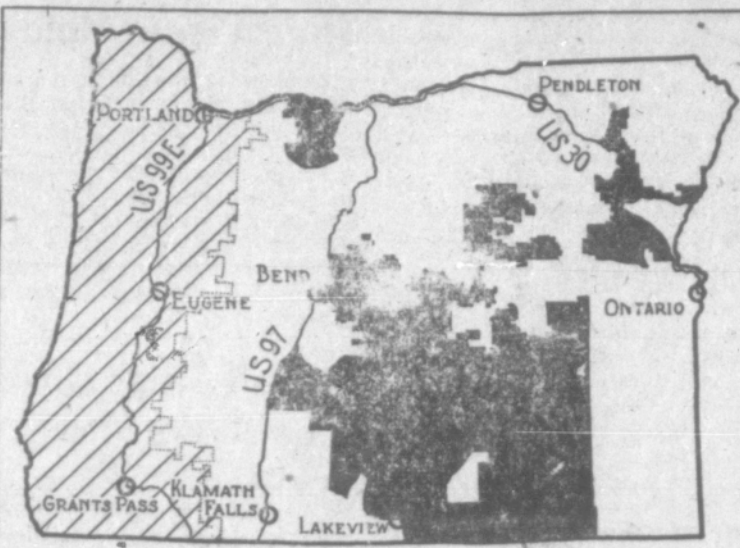

Antelope Hunt Application Deadline Announced

The Oregon State Game commission has announced that all applications for antelope tags received by 5 p. m. last Friday, July 28, will be included in a proposed drawing for 1500 antelope tags. There were 2,920 applications received.

The Game commission's tentative hunting regulations call for a limited antelope season from August 19 to August 25 inclusive. Residents only are eligible to apply for the proposed 1500 antelope tags. Applications may be obtained at any hunting and fishing license agency. Successful applicants will be notified and asked to submit the \$5.00 antelope tag fee.

The designated open area includes all of Deschutes county south of the Bend-Burns highway (U. S. 20) and east of the Dalles-California highway (U. S. 97), all of Lake county exclusive of the area bounded on the west by the Three Flags highway (U. S. 395) and on the east by the Warner valley road, and all of Harney and Malheur counties south of the Bend-Burns highway.

Shrine All Star Football Classic Ups Number Of Trophies For Young Players

PORTLAND, July 26 (Special)—An armful of awards await players of the Oregon All-Stars and Portland All-Stars, who will part the curtains on the 1950 football season here at Multnomah stadium Saturday night, August 26, in the third annual Shriners' hospital game.

The number of trophies for meritorious performances has been upped to five this year. The most coveted award is the traditional outstanding player trophy, won in 1948 by Sam Baker of Corvallis and in 1949 by Don Sloan of Washington.

In addition this year there will be trophies for the outstanding lineman, best back, best passer and for the longest run of the game. One player may win more than one award. Trophies will be passed out at a civic banquet immediately following the game. The selections will be made by a committee of officials and sports writers.

All players participating in the games will receive an engraved belt and buckle, similar to those given Olympic Games competitors. They will also keep their colorful warmup jackets and team pictures. Each player also will become a member of the permanent Shrine game alumni association, for which he will receive a lifetime metal pass entitling him to two tickets to all future games.

Net proceeds from this annual gridiron battle are earmarked for the Shriners' hospital for crippled children, Northwest unit, located in Portland.

Manager James J. Richardson has urged out-to-town fans once

again to secure advance reservations immediately while good seats are still available. They sell for \$3 each and may be obtained by writing game headquarters, Parlor B, Portland hotel.

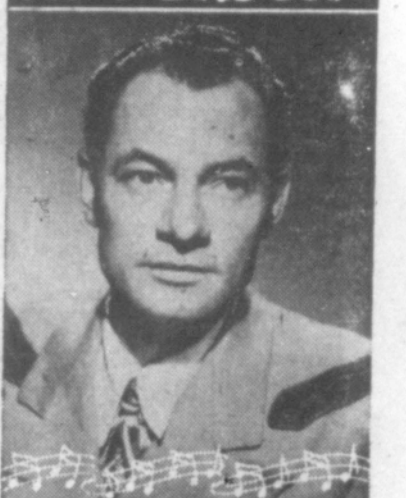
