Coquille Loggers Smash Reedsport

Two-hit pitching by Don White and the slugging bats of Fortier men Douglas, Forkner, Stewart and Hems combined to give the Coquille Loggers a 7-1 decision over Reedsport when the two Southwestern Oregon league teams met at Reedsport Sunday, August 6th. The victory gave the Loggers a firm grip on the number one spot in the league standings.

Dave Douglas opened the top of the first inning with a blistering triple and came home when Pinion, Reedsport right-fielder, dropped Marchand's fly ball.

Reedsport evened the count in the bottom of the inning on a walk, a sacrifice and a Coquille error but was unable to garner a hit off White's offerings.

The Loggers jumped into the lead to stay in the third frame. Dave Douglas led off with a hit in as many times at the plate, Marchand then grounded out to first, and Forkner reached first when Gambit, Reedsport third baseman, bobbled the ball, Douglas advancing to third while Forkner raced on down to second. Both runners crossed the plate on a stinging single off the bat of Bob Stewart.

The fourth Logger came home in the fourth inning. Goodman was safe at first when Fassett, Reedsport shortstop, failed to field the ball. Tommy Hawkins hit a

sharp single, sending Goodman around to third. Seconds later Goodman crossed the plate when Don White laid down a sacrifice bunt along the first base line.

Singles by Hems and Forkner, combined with two Reedsport errors and a fielders' choice, brought two more Loggers home in the sixth, making the score 6-1.

And just to add the finishing touches to the Coquille victory, Al Forkner and Bob Stewart blasted a pair of doubles in the top half of the ninth to bring in the final run of the day, making the score 7-1 in favor of the Loggers.

Reedsport's two lone hits came in the third and fourth innings. Singles by Severson and Fassett were the sum total of base hits given by Don White.

White, in allowing two hits, struck out six and walked two. Hanauska gave up ten hits, struck out four and walked two.

Hems led the parade of sluggers with three for five, while Dave Douglas scored two for four. Forkner and Stewart followed their team-mates with two for five.

The total attendance to date has been approximately nineteen hundred and fifty youngsters with over two hundred and seventy-five registrations and more signing up each day.

Over at North Bend, the luckless Coos Bay team ran into a barrage of base hits that cost them another encounter. Final score of this one was 14-2. North Bend scored two in the second, six in the third and three in the fourth to put the game on ice. Coos Bay came through with two in the ninth, the gift of pitcher Buzz Arlitt.

Sunday, August 13th, the Coquille Loggers play host to Coos Bay at Fortier Field. Powers travels to North Bend and Reedsport goes to Bandon. All games start at 2 p. m.

South Twin Lake Angling Season Extended Until September 15th

The South Twin lake August 15 closing date has been extended to September 15 by the Oregon State Game Commission. The 130 acre lake, a popular trout mecca, is located on the South Century drive near Bend.

This year, anglers have taken many small trout from the lake, but few large rainbow have been caught. By extending the fishing season at South Twin lake, the Game Commission hopes to thin out the present trout population

petition problem. South Twin lake provided excellent trout fishing after it was treated with rotenone to eliminate a large trash fish population in 1941. In the last year, the lake level has been raised considerably by seepage from Crane Prairie reservoir. This has eliminated the natural shoal areas in which the small trout feed and inundated a pine forest floor barren of fish food.

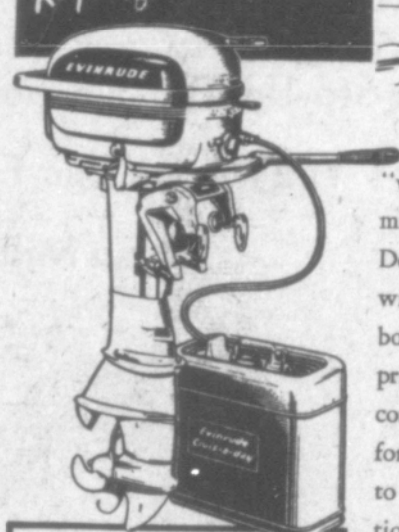
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
