

MEMO TO HOMEMAKERS

We had a good Homemaker's camp last week out at Camp Myrtle Wood. Forty full time campers registered and there were visitors every day. The Bridge Unit visited camp on Thursday their regular meeting day. Four women were up from Curry county including their County Agent, Dorothy Newton. Mrs. Myrtle Chadsey, from Curry county, was in charge of crafts. The women made lovely etched aluminum trays and few made designs in copper. The Hoot Owls initiated one new member into their group, Mrs. Myrtle Chadsey.

This week over a hundred 4-H children will be camping at Camp Myrtle Wood. Walt Schroeder, 4-H agent, has worked up a busy program for them.

With the county fair date fast approaching we are anxious to learn from the 4-H clubs just what demonstrations they are planning to give. It is important that the children have practiced these demonstrations before other groups so they will feel at ease when giving them at the fair.

During the summer months we often eat many of our meals out of doors. It might mean eating a picnic dinner in the park or perhaps you are spending a few days of your vacation camping out.

Some foods do have an especially good flavor cooked out of doors and I will give you some of the menu ideas we tried at a recent conference outing in Corvallis.

Menu I.
Easy ways with tasty hamburgers. For those who have some simple outdoor equipment: toasting forks, reflector, grate or hamburger broilers.

Hamburgers—broiled on stove top or grate or in skillet and kept hot in pan of barbecue sauce.

Toasted Buns—grate and celery seed, butter.

Corn—baked in the husks rolled in wet newspaper.

Vegetable salad—dressing: spice cake (home-made Ready Mix)—baked in reflector over. Serve hot.

Sauce for cake
Coffee, cream sugar.

Menu II.

Quick to pack. Easy to carry. Quick to cook for "Something hot."

Sandwiches—fried or toasted or french fried

Vegetable sticks

Fresh fruit

Cookies—cooked in reflector oven

Cocoa— from mixture of powdered milk, cocoa, sugar

Menu III.

This menu takes longer to prepare. planked salmon, stripped with bacon

tartar sauce

potatoes baked in foil and some baked in mud

bread cooked on sticks and in Dutch oven or skillet

Frozen peas cooked in foil

mixed vegetable salad—french dressing

S'Mores (graham crackers with melted marshmallows and chocolate between)

fresh fruit

coffee, cream, sugar.

With grapes now on the market you might like a couple of fruit salad suggestions.

Try the combination of apple, grapes, celery, bananas and marshmallows. For a choice of dressings you can use: mayonnaise; cooked fruit dressing (below); whipped cream flavored with lemon and other fruit juices, and sugar. Nuts can also be added to the salad.

Fruit Salad Dressing

1/4c. pineapple juice

1/4c. orange juice

1/4c. lemon juice

1/4t. salt

2 eggs

1/2c. sugar

1/2c. whipping cream

Heat fruit juice in double boiler.

Beat eggs slightly and add sugar.

Gradually pour hot juice over egg mixture, stirring constantly. Cook in double boiler until thickened.

Remove and cool. When cold, fold in stiffly whipped cream.

Norway Power Bids Opened

Bids were opened in Portland, August 7, by the Bonneville Power administration on Invitation No. 5264 which provides for the construction of the McKinley Switching Station and the Norway Substation. The following bids were received and are under study prior to award of contract:

West Coast Rushes Telephone Work

The West Coast Telephone company is working at top speed to meet the astonishing growth of telephone traffic in this area, according to George McBride, district manager for the company. Poles and lines between Coquille and Coos Bay to take care of the heavy local traffic between Coos Bay, Coquille and Myrtle Point," said Mr. McBride, "and to permit the installation of carrier systems to take care of Long Distance traffic between Coos Bay, Roseburg and Portland. This will speed up our service between Coos Bay and outside points.

"In addition we have arranged for delivery of a four-channel carrier system, to arrive in September, to be installed between Coos Bay and Crescent City. This will increase the busy hour capacity of Crescent City-Coos Bay facilities by 81 per cent."

Mr. McBride pointed out that this condition of rapid expansion prevails throughout his entire district. He added, "The recent conversion of Brookings, Oregon, to dial automatic service on a 24-hour basis has greatly increased long distance usage in that area. The traffic between Crescent City and points south is increasing rapidly and a few days ago the company completed installation of new circuits that will increase the busy hour capacity for traffic between Crescent City and points south by fifty-seven per cent."

St. James' Church Starts Expansion

Ground was broken this week for the expansion of St. James' Episcopal church in Coquille. Plans include increasing the facilities of the church by enlarging the parish hall and adding a new kitchen complete with all facilities. A new club room to accommodate guild meetings and other parish functions as well as a choir room is included in the plans.

Alterations inside the church proper embody a new sacristy for the altar guild and recessing of the present organ.

Contractors for the entire building program are Wold Brothers of Bandon. J. S. Barton, Sr., and Floyd Robb are acting as contact men for the parish. The work is expected to be completed within sixty days. Project cost will run between \$15,000 to \$20,000.
