Weyerhaeuser Plant Well Underway

NORTH BEND—Aug. 9 (Special)—With additional crews starting work on various phases of construction, Weyerhaeuser's sawmill at North Bend is beginning to take form. Approximately 350 men are employed on the 40-acre millsite.

Exterior siding and roof decking is being applied to the last of four buildings which comprise the planing mill unit. This is the longest building of the group, next to the Coos Bay-North Bend highway. Roof covering has been placed on the other units.

Brick is being laid for the walls of the dry kilns. These units are directly in front of the planing mill buildings and will dry the lumber for planing mill surfacing.

Structural framework for the south end of the millsite has been put in place and roof decking is being applied. This unit will house the headrig and remanufacturing machinery which will convert logs from Weyerhaeuser's Millicoma Forest into boards and timbers. Logging began on this area the last of July.

Engineers have begun work on the power plant, for which foundations are being placed. This plant, deriving fuel from sawmilling by-products, will furnish electrical energy and steam to run the sawmill facilities.

Industrial fencing is being installed along the highway edge of the millsite. Southern Pacific tracks have been relocated to parallel the plant site.

The main office of the company, occupied the latter part of May, is gradually filling up with personnel required to supervise the many construction and employment activities. The office site has been landscaped and planted with grass.

Arthur O. Karlen is manager of Weyerhaeuser's Coos Bay branch operation, in charge of logging and milling activities. John Gischel supervises general construction activities, assisted by O. D. McCarty. Del Hilliard is resident engineer, representing the firm's Tacoma, Washington, engineering department, which designed the mill.

Shirley Temple Due In Sparkling New "Corliss Archer" Film Comedy

When F. Hugh Herbert sat down in his study one evening and dashed out a short story for Good Housekeeping Magazine called "A Family Affair," he hadn't the slightest idea that in Corliss Archer, his central character, he had fashioned a bobby soxer who was to be the epitome of all teen-agers throughout the United States. But the character became so popular, Herbert decided to write a play woven around her. That was how "Kiss and Tell," a Broadway hit for two seasons, came to be born. Currently, Shirley can again be seen on the screen as Corliss Archer, in "A Kiss for Corliss," Heart-breaker David Niven co-stars with Shirley in this delightful comedy, with Darryl Hickman as her devoted boy friend, cut little Virginia Welles as her "companion in crime" and Gloria Holden and Tom Tully as her doting parents.
