Let's Have Ice Cream with Blackberry Pie To Tease Our Palate and Tickle the Kids

"Let's have ice cream for dessert!" How many homemakers have responded to this youthful cry—not only because ice cream is so good to eat, but because it is ready to serve in a moment. Ice cream is the perfect dessert for warm weather meals, whether they are served indoors or out on the porch or at a picnic. It's cool, delicious and refreshing—and a very nutritious food, too. Ice cream is good for you!

Desserts such as pies, cakes or fruit taste better when combined with ice cream. Pie or cake tastes twice as good when served "a la mode," and fresh fruits and ice cream make the coolest, hot weather dessert imaginable!

You will never be at a loss for desserts or refreshments if you keep ice cream on hand. For short storage put a carton on the bottom shelf of the freezing unit of your refrigerator, or fit the ice cream snugly into an ice tray, cover with waxed paper and keep in freezing unit until ready to serve.

Ice cream sundaes are favorites no matter what the season. Top dishes of vanilla ice cream with semi-sweet chocolate shavings, crushed peanut brittle, gingerbread or macaroon crumbs, toasted coconut, gundrop bits, crushed peppermint candy or chopped nut meats. For quick saucy sundaes top vanilla ice cream with cranberry sauce, rhubarb sauce, honey nut, or equal amounts of chocolate and marshmallow sauces. There is no end to the easy delicious ways to serve ice cream.

BLACKBERRY PIE A LA MODE

(Makes 1 9-inch pie)

Pastry
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup sifted flour
1/4 tsp. nutmeg
1/4 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 tsp. salt
4 cups blackberries
2 Tbsp. butter
1 Tbsp. lemon juice
Vanilla ice cream

Line a 9-inch pie pan with pastry. Mix sugar, flour, nutmeg, cinnamon and salt. Put one-third of berries in pie shell. Sprinkle with one-third of sugar mixture. Dot with one-third of butter. Repeat twice. Sprinkle with lemon seal edges well. Cut gashes in pastry for steam to escape. Bake in a hot oven 400 degrees F., for about 45 minutes. Cool and serve with vanilla ice cream.

MOCHA FUDGE SAUCE

(Makes 8 to 10 servings)

3 squares unsweetened chocolate
1/2 cup strong coffee
1/4 cup milk
1/2 cup sugar
1 Tbsp. butter
Few grains salt
1/2 tsp. vanilla

Cook chocolate, coffee and milk together over low heat, stirring constantly until smooth. Add sugar, butter and salt. Continue to cook over moderate heat, stirring constantly for three to five minutes until slightly thickened. Remove from heat. Add vanilla. Serve warm or cold. Yields about 1 1/2 cups sauce.

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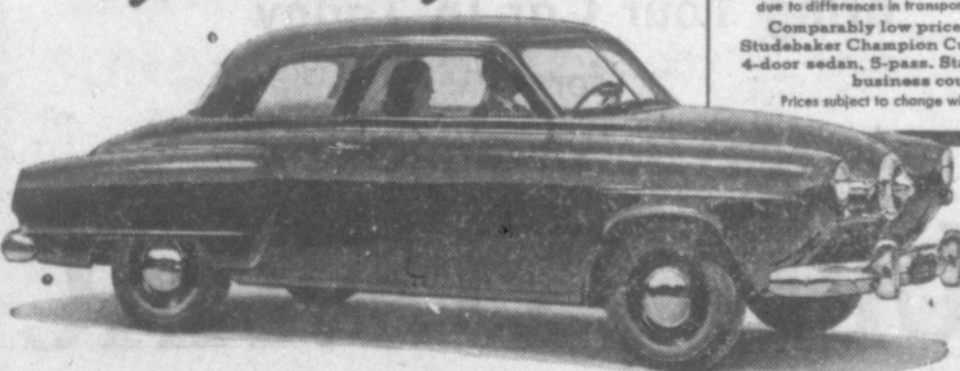
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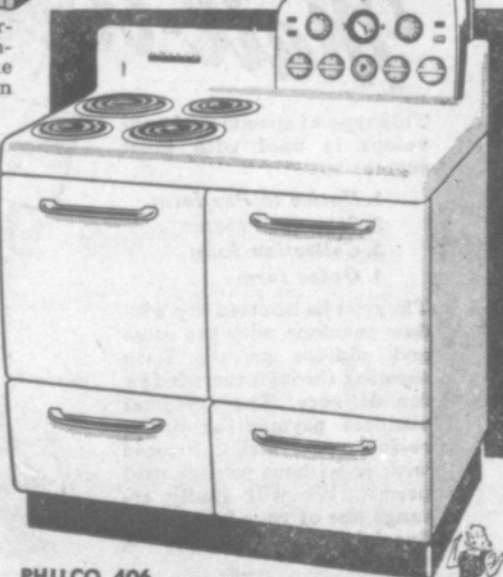
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
