Forest Study Will Check Local Area

The Bureau of Land Management this week is getting underway on an inventory of the administrative forest units on the south fork of the Coos river, the east fork of the Coquille river, according to Ross Youngblood, district BLM forester.

The bureau has never had an actual inventory of the standing timber in Coos county, Youngblood said. It has been using the economic resource survey of 1938, which consisted primarily of spot checks. The bureau expects to find 10 to 25 per cent greater volume than it now lists.

Timber management plans will be made on the basis of the current survey, which will require about a year to complete.

William Sankela, forester in charge of inventories for the BLM regional office, is here to direct the survey, with a staff made up of Richard Herstine and Everett Meier. They will work out of the Coos Bay office. The crew is now laying out control points of reference.

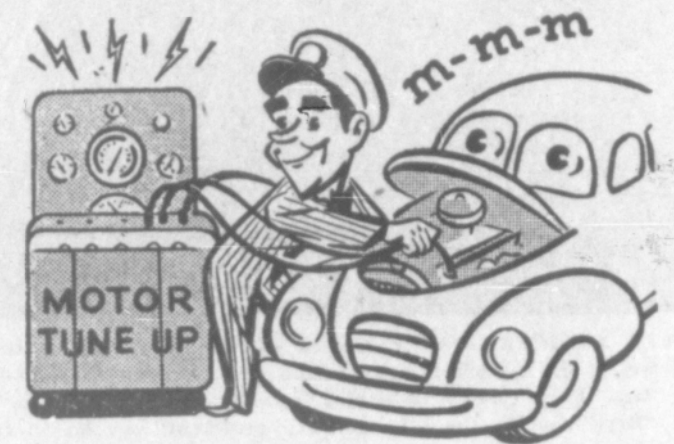

It's Dill Pickle Time
1 quart water.
1 pint vinegar
1/2 cup (scant cup)
Bring this to a boil and set it off to cool. Pour your cooled solution in each quart and seal your jars. Place in a dark place for eight weeks. They are tops. (This recipe makes four quarts.)
