Historic "Donkey" Given Museum

One of the first steam engines to be used in logging operations in Coos county has been donated to the Coos-Curry Pioneer Museum in Coquille by William Vaughan of North Bend. The spool donkey engine was purchased by the Vaughan Company in 1905, after it had been used for several years in the county. It was in operation at Blue Ridge until 1935.

Reconditioned by William Leuthold of the Vaughan company, the engine can now be seen in Myrtle Grove, near the museum in Coquille.

Also displayed at the museum is an antique telegraph instrument which has been loaned by Mrs. Belle Laird.

Mrs. Ila Bradford and her son have left on a vacation trip to Leslie, Arkansas, where they will visit relatives.

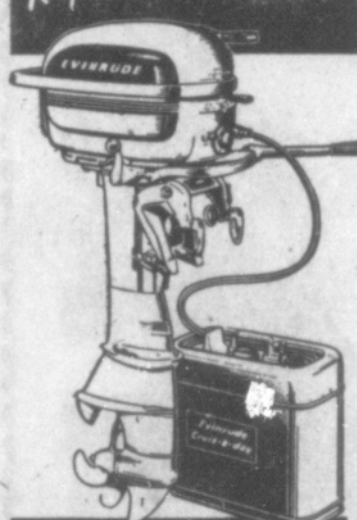
