Loggers Move Into Final Round SWO Play, Blast North Bend 7-1 Here Sunday

Coquille's mighty Loggers roared into the final round of the Southwestern Oregon baseball league playoffs by defeating North Bend 7-1 at Fortier Field Sunday afternoon, August 27th. Don White went the route for the Fortiemens.

The Loggers jumped into a one run lead in the first-inning on singles by Dave Douglas and Bob Stewart. Then in the second, Phil Stienberg blasted a home-run to stretch the Coquille lead to two runs. Marv Goodman followed Stienberg's circuit clout with a single and Larry Hems came through with a double, but Goodman was thrown out attempting to steal second, while Hawkins struck out and White flied out to retire the side.

Two more Loggers came home in the fourth on two hits, two stolen bases, a passed ball and a wild throw by the North Bend pitcher. Bob Stewart, first man to face pitcher Scrivens in the inning, was thrown out third to first. Phil Stienberg drew a free trip to first base when he was hit by a pitched ball and then promptly stole second. Marv Goodman flied out to first and Larry Hems cracked out to a single to score Stienberg. Hems then stole second and came home on Tommy Hawkins' single. Don White was thrown out shortstop to first to retire the side.

The fifth Coquille counter crossed the plate in the sixth, the product of a walk, a stolen base, a fielder's choice and a North Bend error.

A walk and a North Bend error put two Loggers on base in the seventh, just in time to be driven home by a blistering triple off the bat of Larry Hems to make the score 7-0 in favor of the Fortiemens.

Don White held the visitors scoreless throughout the first eight innings of the game, giving up four scattered hits, all singles. But finally in the top of the ninth, North Bend collected two hits; a

double by Lusby and a single by Segura to break into the score column with one run.

In holding North Bend to six hits, and one run, White kept his pitching record of the season as the outstanding hurler of the league. White gave up one walk and struck out three North Benders.

Scrivens, losing pitcher, allowed nine hits for seven runs, gave up two walks and struck out three.

Loggers To Meet Bandon Here Sunday; North Bend Tangles With Powers; Both Games End SWO League 1050 Playoffs

It will be Coquille vs. Bandon for the Southwestern Oregon league playoffs championship at Fortier Field Sunday afternoon, September 3rd. The traditional rivals reached the finals by virtue of a Coquille win over North Bend, 7-1, and a Bandon win over Powers, 6-2. Both semi-final games were played at Fortier.

The consolation game, which will start at one o'clock, will pit the Powers Athletic club against the North Bend Townies. Both were losers in the semi-final round.

Manager Bill Fortier of the Loggers will rely on Don White and Herb West for mound duty, but will be without the services of veteran catcher Tommy Hawkins. Hawkins, a naval reservist, has been ordered to active duty. A possible replacement behind the plate for Coquille is Dick Bishop of Reedport. Bishop caught one of the playoff games for the Loggers last year when Hawkins was not available.

One other Logger, Larry Hems, will not be on hand for this final game. Hems, who has played a

Loggers Show Powers Memorial Cup To Club

Members of the Coquille Bleacher club got a good look at the Lester Powers Memorial cup awarded this year to the Coquille Loggers for winning the S. W. O. championship when it was shown to the club at its noon meeting Monday.

The cup was presented in memory of Lester Powers, organizer and manager of the gallant Pow-

ers Athletic club. Powers died in an accident a little over a year ago. The cup was given by Bill Ross and Ray Brooks of the Portland Athletic Supply company.

A motion was made by the club to arrange for the building of a trophy case in the community building in which all cups and awards won by local groups could be exhibited safely.

Chairman George Ulett of the Coquille Swimming Pool committee reported on the swimming pool and said the California Filter company would be testing the filters Friday.

A report was also given telling of the piling brought from the Coos Bay Lumber company to Fortier Field for the start of the night-lighting of the field.

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Big Game Hunt Applications Available

Tag applications for two special big game seasons, a cow elk hunt in Union county and an antlerless deer hunt in Lake and Klamath counties, are now available at all Oregon State Game commission license agencies.

The 250 cow elk tags to be issued will be valid from November 11 to 19 inclusive. The cow elk area is on the Starkey range between the upper Grande Ronde river and La Grande. Deadline for receipt of tag applications is 5:00 P.M., October 6. A drawing will be held, October 10 if more than 250 applications are received.

Elk winter range in the Starkey area is in critical condition, and the concentrated animals made heavy use of grazing lands last spring, states Bob Mace, chief of big game for the Game commission.

On October 18 and 19 hunters with special tags will have an opportunity to harvest 1500 antlerless deer from the interstate herd recommended by the interstate deer herd committee, half the deer to be taken by Oregon hunters and the other 1500 by California hunters. The committee administers a co-operative study by California, Oregon, and U. S. forest service. Winter range carrying capacity determines the number of animals to be taken jointly each year by Oregon and California.

Tag fees for the two special big game hunts are \$5.00. Applicants should not submit the fee until notified by the game commission that they have drawn a tag.
