Coquille Water 5 Days Shorter Than Last Year

Coquille's water is five days' supply lower than it was at the same time last year, according to city engineer, Joe Kuffler. Wednesday's level was 36,000,000 gallons and the approximate daily consumption is between one-half and three-quarter million gallons.

Regulations for watering set by the city are not being regarded by many citizens, Kuffler said. Violation of the water restriction order, which is authorized to guarantee a supply of water throughout the whole season, hurts every citizen in the area, Kuffler points out.

Drastic penalties will be enforced if the townspeople do not abide by the regulations, Kuffler states.

Cheese Factory Remains At Arago

Construction of a 100 by 60 foot \$80,000 modern cheese factory at Arago was voted last week by stockholders and members of the Arago Cooperative cheese association at a special meeting at the Arago gymnasium.

Fifty-five people attended the meeting presided over by President Frank Burbank who reported that his group had been forced to turn down an offer to build in Coquille due to the high price of the only possible site in this city.

Insurance from the old factory which was recently destroyed by fire amounted to \$41,000 with the balance of the needed amount to be raised by the association.

Two members of the Challenge Cream and Butter association, Paul Stocklin, production manager, and Paul Simpson, treasurer, were present at the meeting to aid in planning for the new cheese factory.

A Coquille Chamber of Commerce committee had worked in Coquille on the problem of aiding the Arago plant secure a site here. Under consideration had been an acre tract just west of the city belonging to George Oerding.
