### Third Fire Of Season Breaks Out Sunday Morning Near Coal Creek S.E. Of Powers

The third fire of the season broke out about 6:00 p. m. Sunday about five miles southeast of Powers at Coal Creek in Coos Bay Logging company holdings in rocky, steep country.

The fire spread down hill, then burned back up and about noon Monday had covered 30 acres with an estimated loss of a million or a million and a half of board feet of timber. Thirty-five Coos Bay employees and pumpers fought the flames. One man, Rex Long, was injured in trying to get out, a log fell on him and injured his leg. He was taken out by speeder to Mast hospital.

Some of the crew saw a beautiful big buck deer trying to get out and they tried to be as quiet as possible so as not to frighten him but he saw them and ran right back into the blaze and was burned to death.

Fire was caused by a lightning storm and several other fires from the same cause were reported in the Siskiyou forest.

At the present writing the fire is under control.

Tangerine ice cream and sherbet will soon be on the market. This is made with tangerine puree and has a very delicious flavor.



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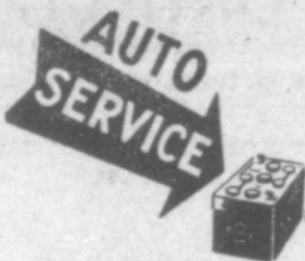
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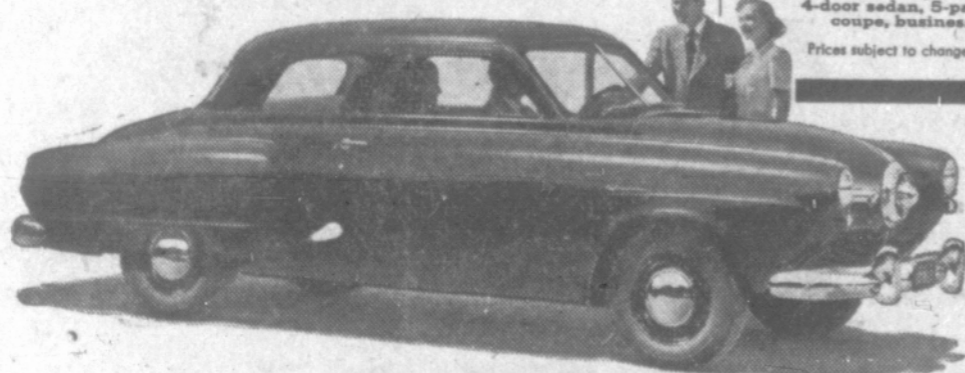
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
