**Apple Dumplings**  
from "The Norge Cookbook"  
8 medium apples  
1/2 cup butter  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1 1/2 cups brown sugar  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind

Paré and core apples. Mix brown sugar, butter, salt, cinnamon and lemon rind together and fill each apple cavity with part of mixture. Roll baking powder biscuit dough to 1/4-inch thickness; cut into squares large enough to cover apple. Place apple on each square and bring corners together, by moistening edges and pinching dough to hold apple in place. Bake in moderate oven 350 degrees F. Serve with plain lemon sauce. Makes eight dumplings.
