## Hapless Siuslaw Downed In Tussle By 47-14 Score

Rolling across the goal line seven times, the Coquille high school gridmen piled up their fourth straight victory as they defeated Siuslaw 47-14 at Florence Friday afternoon.

It took the Coquille Red Devils only five plays to push over their first tally. The last two of these consisted of passes from the rifle arm of Gerard Jeub as he connected with outstretched arms of Larry Schweinfurt and then of Eddie Howe who scored. Keith Parry converted with a line buck.

Finest run of the game came early in the second period when Keith Parry raced seventy yards to put Coquille out front 13-0. His attempted line buck for conversion failed.

Midway through the same canto Coquille received the ball on their own 21. Howe ran it to the 30. Lynn Purvis received a Jeub pass to advance to the 45. Doug Ostrander gained five more yards by the aerial route. Coquille lost five on next play because of off side to make it first and 15. Eddie Howe picked up a first down and advanced to the Siuslaw 45. Parry received a pass for five yards and on the next play Purvis accepted a pass to race the remainder of the field for the touchdown.

A few seconds later Siuslaw had two tries for conversion as Coquille was offside as it blocked the placekick. The score at half-time was Coquille 19 Siuslaw 7. A pass to Schweinfurt early in the third period made it 25-7, but Siuslaw retaliated with another pass to score and convert.

This was the last time for the host squad to threaten the Red Devil goal line and within half a dozen plays Wilson had scored as a result of a Jeub pass to increase the Red Devil margin 31-14. Rod Noah successfully bucked the line for the extra point.

Coquille didn't take a break as it made a sustained drive to the Siuslaw two yard line where Jeub carried the ball into paydirt. Siuslaw was credited with a touchback after the kickoff to put the score at 41-14. Earlier Danielson had bucked successfully for the extra point.

Coquille's final tally came when Doug Kistner intercepted a Siuslaw pass and raced sixty yards for the score. Final count Coquille 47 Siuslaw 14.

Coquille high school's strong Red Devils will have a recess from their grid season this weekend as they prime for the North Bend Bulldogs Oct. 13.

Coquille has been undefeated in four starts and the Bulldogs have dropped one encounter. This loss to North Bend was not serious as it was to the clever Grants Pass squad who won by one point. The Bulldogs are rated best in the district by many observers but Coquille's record is impressive.
