

Coos Democrats Outnumber GOP's

Democrat majority in Coos county is the story of a steady growth since November 1936 when the Bourbons moved ahead by two voters.

Now with a 2,310 lead, they have 918 more Demos than in November 1948.

The republicans lead in registration in 13 of the county's 58 precincts, with the democrats ahead in the other 45 precincts.

The biggest precinct registration is North Bend West, precinct 9, with 742. Others over 600 are Coquille North, precinct 38, with 638; North Bend Central two precinct 12, with 665, and Charleston, precinct 23, with 623. The Charleston precinct is the largest one with only one board, which must supervise the voting and then count the ballots. The other large precincts have separate counting boards.

An Oregon registered Jersey cow has been rated as a Tested Dam by The American Jersey Cattle Club. The distinction was awarded Volunteer Myrtle of I. N. for having four offspring with official production records. She is owned by W. R. Davenport, of Myrtle Point, Oregon.

The cow's descendants averaged 11,847 pounds of milk and 707 pounds of butterfat on twice daily milking, mature equivalent basis. The tests were checked by official representatives of the club.

The production testing carried on by Davenport is part of a program offered by The American Jersey Cattle club to make possible the continuous improvement of the Jersey breed. The club's national headquarters is in Columbus, Ohio.
