Better Logging Roads Stressed Last Week At Pacific Logging Congress Sessions

Loggers and foresters attending the final sessions of the 41st annual meeting of the Pacific Logging congress last week received a session on the construction of logging roads.

E. P. Stamm, chief forester of Crown Zellerbach, placed particular emphasis on present day needs in capacity and size of loads, engineering problems, construction methods and equipment and many other phases related to good logging roads.

Referring to the deterioration of many roads, Stamm said:

"When they have gone to pieces under heavy traffic, the public has placed the blame on truck operators in spite of the fact that many of these so-called roads were never fit for any vehicle heavier than a touring car or a pickup truck.

"In the Northwest the log truck is generally considered to be responsible," he added. "I have never learned just who is responsible for the road troubles

in state where there are no forests."

Stamm said one single fact remains—"very few of our roads were designed or built to carry even those loads which are legally allowed in the various states."

Turning to private logging roads, the forester declared that practically every logger puts a minimum of ten per cent of his expenditures into road building.

"If he could properly evaluate or measure his costs of road and equipment maintenance and other direct costs, he would easily account for 15 to 20 per cent of his total logging costs and one could probably account for expenditures of \$20 million a year for the Douglas fir region. This does not account for the on-the-highway costs," he said.

Among recommendations made by Stamm were more and better road engineering, proper drainage, more building of roads in order to reduce yarding distances and cold-decking and a consistent program of maintenance.

Oregon Coast Highway Association Meet Will Boost Oregon at Coos Bay Next Week

Oregon Coast boosters will register Sunday afternoon, November 12, in Coos Bay for the annual convention of the eight-county Oregon Coast association. Registration headquarters will be set up at the Coos Bay Chamber of Commerce office in the lobby of the Tloga Hotel with Mrs. Verne Tinnerstet in charge.

Delegates will convene at the city hall in Coos Bay Monday morning, November 13th at 10:00 a. m. for a business session, where reports of officers and committees will be presented, and a general discussion of association problems will be held. Wm. R. Manion of Seaside, president of the association, will preside.

V. A. McNeil, manager of the Portland Visitors Information center will speak to the delegation at this session.

President of the Coos Bay Chamber of Commerce, R. W. Van Auken, will welcome the OCA delegation at the Monday luncheon. Leith Abbot, Foote Cone and Belding Advertising Agency of Portland will be guest speaker.

Discussion on highway improvements will occupy the fore part of the afternoon, followed by County meetings and a meeting of the Recommendations and Nominations committees.

The evening banquet guests will hear Frank Joseph of the Hollywood Boosters, Portland.

The last meeting of the retiring board of directors is scheduled to occupy the Tuesday morning hours followed by a joint noon luncheon with the Coos Bay Rotary club with C. A. Lockwood, state game director as guest speaker.

Reports of nominating and resolutions committee will be given at the Tuesday afternoon session by L. R. Case, Tillamook, chairman of the nominations committee, and Deane Ruth of Seaside, chairman of the resolutions committee; followed by election of president, treasurer, corporation secretary and county vice-presidents for the ensuing year.

The convention will wind up Tuesday evening with a banquet and entertainment.

Radio station KOOS will broadcast the major talks and highlights of the convention.

Convention guests will include officials of both Oregon and Washington, travel promotion officials and resort and hotel operators from British Columbia, Washington, Oregon and California.

Attending from Coquille will be Clarence Osika and Claude Mason representing the Coquille Chamber of Commerce. Also present will be members of the Coos county court.

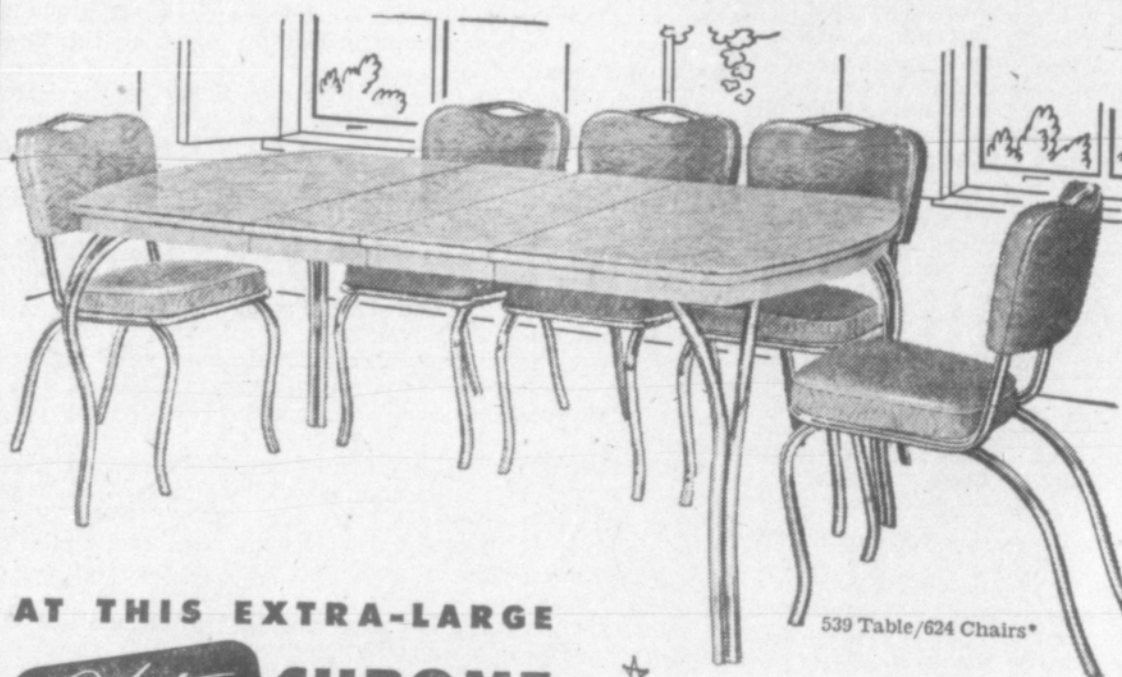
