HOSPITAL CHEER

The Coquille Girl Scout Troop No. 13, under the leadership of Mrs. Ralph Stuller and Mrs. E. J. Throckmorton, are making Christmas garlands to brighten the wards of patients at Roseburg Veterans Hospital. This is a Junior Red Cross project.

More than a hundred Christmas gifts for hospitalized veterans, in addition to nuts, candy, books and other items, were delivered, Monday, to the Roseburg Veterans Hospital and Camp White Veterans Center at Medford, through the efforts of Mrs. J. Arthur Berg, Red Cross Volunteer Service Chairman,

and Mrs. J. L. Hansen, Hospital Chairman of Coos Bay.

FIRST AID

Many former Red Cross First Aid Instructors who served during the World War II are volunteering their services again to conduct First Aid classes—in line with the cooperative planning between Red Cross and Civil Defense.

Plans are being made for a National Red Cross Instructor to conduct a course for First Aid Instructors in the very near future. Anyone who has satisfactorily completed both Standard and Advanced First Aid courses or who may have taught such courses in the past and wish recertification may do so by contacting Mrs. Ernest Strong, Coquille, or by notifying the Chapter Office in Coos Bay. Many instructors are needed to train several thousand people in Coos county in First Aid and your interest will be welcomed.

A class in Standard First Aid

will begin immediately after the first of the year with Mrs. Ernest Strong as instructor. At least one member in every household should learn First Aid. Contact Mrs. Strong, telephone 3651 or 301, Coquille, to enroll.
