School Population Increases In County

The school population in Coos county is now 11,243, according to census figures released this week by the county school superintendent. Of the number 5777 are boys and 5466 are girls. An increase of 1162 over last year is indicated.

On a mathematical basis the Coquille census has been set at 1339 an increase over last year's total which was 1287.

The census for Myrtle Point 4C shows an increase of 138 over the 1949 census. Myrtle Point, now eligible to become a first class district, has a right to vote out of the rural school district within 90 days following the determination of the census if it elects to do so.

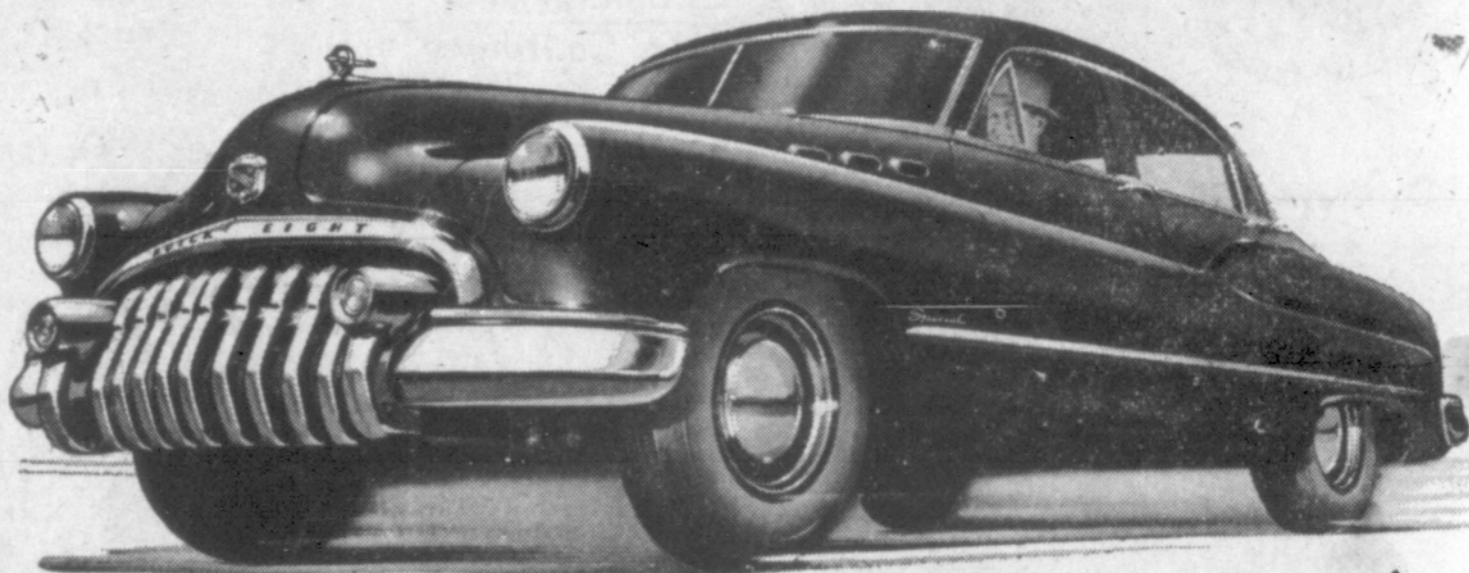
