Oregon Ducks Slate Two Games

University of Oregon. (Special)—Oregon's basketball Ducks wind up a session with final examinations this week and resume non-conference action with a pair of games against the strong Wyoming Cowboys at Laramie. The 15-man travelling party will make the trip by train.

Coach John Warren said today that he felt the next six games would do much to determine the strength of the Webfoots for the 1951 conference race. "After playing Wyoming, College of Puget Sound and Santa Clara six games in nine days we should know pretty much what we can do in tough competition. We will have to be ready for that series in Seattle on January 5 and 6 against Washington if we hope to make a race of it when the conference schedule opens," Warren stated.

The bench strength of the Ducks is expected to get a stiff test in the half-dozen encounters. The starting lineup of Will Urban and Curt Barclay at forwards, Jim Loscutt at center and Ken Hunt and Jack Keller at guards can't be expected to through without considerable help from the reserves.

Jim Vranizan, Mel Streeter and Keith Farnam are tabbed for action at forward, with Chet Noe and Henry Bonnemann at center and Art Shepherd and Mel Krause at guard. These 12 men are leading in the fight for spots on the travel squad and unless John Neeley or Hal Webb breaks in later should constitute the Duck personnel for the trips to Laramie and Tacoma.

The fine play of Cuscutoff, Noe, Farnam, Shepherd and Barclay among the newcomers and the steady work of the veterans, Urban, Krause, Hunt, Keller, Streeter and Vranizan has highlighted the workouts which followed the UCLA series.

Arago Resident Lands Big Steelhead To Cop First In 2nd Week Of Derby

Bill Sinko of Arago, during the past week, landed the biggest steelhead yet to be turned in on the Myrtle Point-Powers Lions clubs Steelhead Derby, according to Bub Mast, chairman of the Myrtle Point club's committee. Mr. Sinko's beautiful "sparkler" tipped the scales at 17 pounds, 5 1/4 ounces, and he wins the first prize of the week, a Dormeyer Electric Fry-Well, which has a value of \$27.50.

POWERS MEN WIN

It's a good thing for Mr. Sinko that his was a big one, because there's pitchin' "with beauties that tipped the scales at more than 14 pounds. H. A. Taylor landing a speckled beauty for second prize that weighed 14 pounds, 4 ounces, winning him a glass combination fly and casting rod, valued at \$15.00, while C. D. Conger won the victory over a speckled beauty weighing 12 pounds, 13 1/2 ounces, copping the third weekly prize, a seven strand crimping pliers, leader and sleeves.

OTHER CATCHES

Harold Ross, representing the Powers Lions club in the Steelhead Derby, brought the derby tickets in Monday. Other catches made during the week were: Duane Hayes, of Gaylor, who won in last week's prizes, turned in the second largest catch of the week, a 14-lb., 9-oz. beauty; C. D. Conger of Powers, landed a 12-lb., 13 1/2-ounce Steelhead; Harry Collier of Arago, an 11-lb., 12-ounce fish; Dewey Winkelman of Gaylor, turned in a Steelhead that weighed 10 lbs., 5 oz.; G. A. Young of Remote, copped a 9-pounder and R. C. Bonds not only landed the smallest fish yet weighed in, but might be the smallest during the derby. His Steelhead weighed only 2 lbs., 8 1/2 ounces.
