## Milk Can Be Checked For You

Consumers of Coos county who are uncertain as to the legal status of any raw milk supply being offered for sale for human consumption are advised to get in touch with the state department of agriculture representative in this area Wilbur W. Maltby, 1744 Johnson Street, North Bend. The Oregon fluid milk act requires these dairies to meet certain sanitation and disease-free herd requirements and to be licensed before offering such milk for sale.

The consumer who obtains milk from an uninspected and unlicensed source is ignoring the safeguards established by law to protect the public. Milk by its very nature is peculiarly susceptible to contamination and adulteration. Such diseases as undulant fever (Bang's disease), tuberculosis, typhoid, diptheria and scarlet fever may be transmitted by milk. Consumers are advised to play it safe by getting milk only from inspected and licensed sources.

## New Equipment Expedites Weed Control In County

Control of tansy ragwort in Coos county is being greatly benefited by newly acquired county spraying equipment, according to Jack Wood, Assistant County Agent.

A 4-wheel drive truck equipped with a tank and a pump to deliver spray for two one-hundred foot lengths of hose and orchard nozzles provides a unit capable of getting over fairly rough terrain. In order to spray at greater distances from the truck and with more flexibility than a hose permit, a crew of 3 men have been hand spraying with knapsack sprayers, similar to those used for firefighting, which can be conveniently filled at the truck.

Mr. Arnold Hildebrandt, Vocational Instructor at Myrtle Point High School, has taken two weeks of his vacation time to assist, as well as arranging for two of his students, Gus Sanford and Harvey (Buck) McCall, to work. The fellows are doing a conscientious job.

Albert Backman of Coquille has been hired by the county court to operate the spray equipment on a full time basis. Mr. Backman was also very valuable to building the rig.

This equipment went into operation June 1 on government land in the Rowland Creek area will be getting as much attention as possible during most of the spraying season remaining.

In that the tansy has become so well entrenched in several areas that control is more costly than the land is worth, public interest and assistance becomes very important. The county is presently financing a weed inspector, Dr. Alfred Allen of Bandon. As well as the spraying equipment and operator. The Federal Bureau of Land Management has been allotted limited funds for control of tansy on land administered by them such as O and C and Coos Bay Wagon Road Lands in the county. The Agricultural Conservation Program (PMA) is assisting farmers with part of the costs of chemicals and of applying the chemicals.

The county owned equipment is intended to control weeds on county owned land, as well as assisting as much as possible with control on other land, in which case a charge of \$5.00 per hour plus chemical is ask for the rig and operator. In order to bring about a constant decline in the amount of tansy, however, it will be necessary for as many land owners with tansy as possible to have their own sprayers. Pumps that can be mounted on truck or tractor power-take-offs and develops 200-400 pounds pressure can be purchased quite reasonably—as can a 100 ft. of pressure hose and nozzle.

Oil drums can serve as tanks. Such sprayers can also be used for brush and livestock pest control. (Further information is available at the Agricultural Extension Office in Coquille.)

This weed has a showy yellow flower head which can be seen during a period of from late June to September. It has lacy, green leaves. Sportsman, Forest Service or Fire Service personnel as well as ranchers and others can be very helpful by reporting locations not previously known to have the weed, and by pulling the lone plants and destroying their seed which can be easily make one more infested area.

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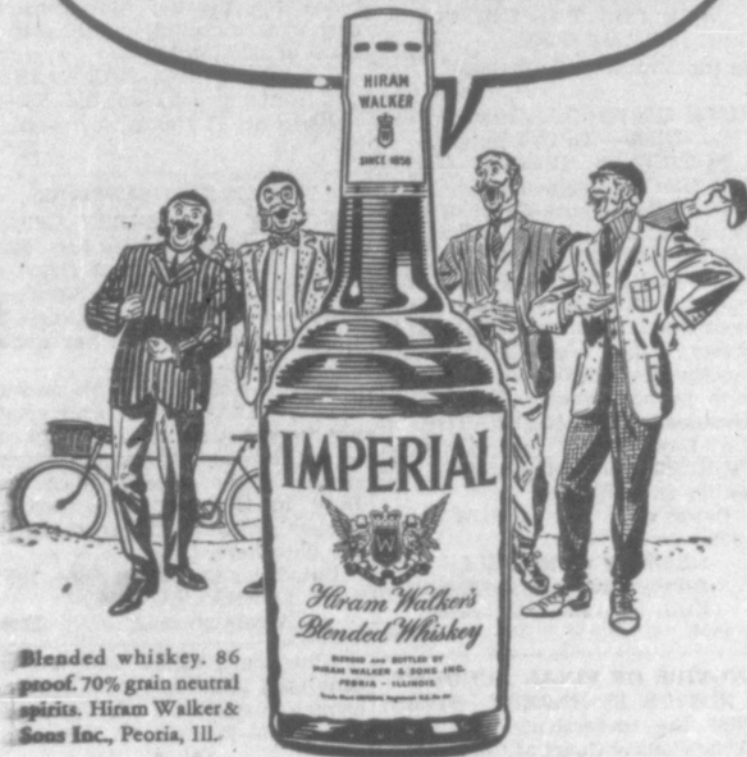
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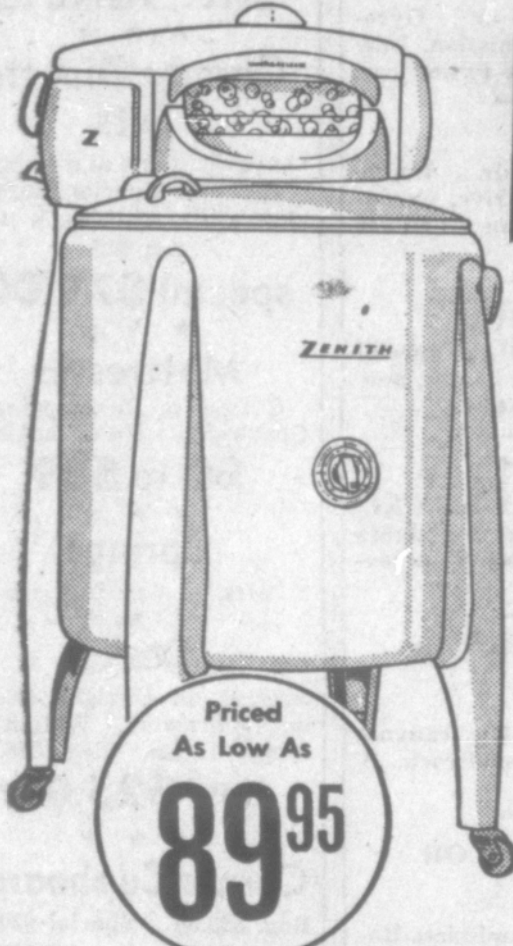
