On hand to explain these meat price rules will be Marvin Craser, OPS business analyst in meat, from the Portland office.

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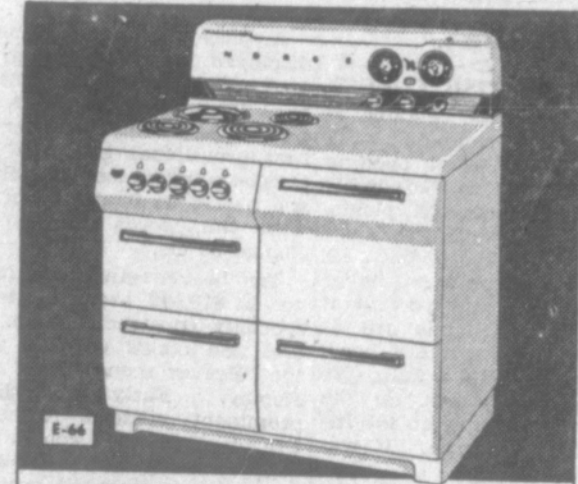
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
