## Dr. Gutman To Leave County

Resignation of Dr. Eleanor B. Gutman, Coos county health officer since the end of the second World War, was accepted Friday by the Coos county court.

Dr. Gutman who is slated to receive her master's degree in public health administration from the University of California in Berkeley this month has been on a years leave of absence.

The court made no statement as to plans for the future though it is understood that the demand for higher salary for Dr. Gutman by the state had something to do with the resignation.

Last week the county health association also went on record opposing any movement that would allow Coos county to operate without a full-time public health doctor. Dr. Gutman in a public statement said: "I leave Coos county with considerable regret, having found it a friendly and receptive place in which to work."

## Coquille Lads Urged To Try For Baseball Team

The New York Giants will hold a baseball tryout camp in the state of Oregon this year as they realize that Oregon is fertile ground for prospective Major League players, and Coquille players are urged to try-out.

Eddie Montague, former Major League and Coast League player, who is now scouting on the West Coast for the N. Y. Giants will be on hand at Hillsboro, Ore. to look over young prospects.

The Giants will hold their fourth annual tryout camp at Hillsboro, Ore. The camp will run for three days beginning on the 28th of June. The camp will start at ten o'clock (promptly) in the morning and wind up at two p.m.

Herb Eyestone of Portland, a Giants Representative will be in charge of camp activities.

All players eligible to sign a professional baseball contract are invited to attend. There is no charge of any kind to the player or the fan who may wish to see the games, as the camps are strictly a hunt for talent for the Giants Farm Clubs.

Players must pay their own expenses to and from the camp but, if they are signed to a contract, full expenses will be refunded them. The Giants will furnish the bats and balls. Players must bring their own uniforms.

While these camps are strictly a hunt for talent and not a baseball school as much instruction as time will permit, will be given by the men in charge.

Games will be played each day and all players will be given an equal chance to participate in them, in order to show their ability.
