A side-line of the tour was to show some of the West Coast's attractions to Miss Ita Posch, Oregon's International Farm Youth Exchange from the Netherlands. Ita accompanied us on the entire trip and was greatly impressed by a great many of the things she saw. She commented especially about the beautiful sea coast between here and Eureka, Calif. Other highlights of the trip were in visiting the tallest tree in the world (364 ft.), seeing and crossing the Golden Gate Bridge, visiting China Town in San Francisco, and going on a Tour through Shasta Dam. Ita also got to see her first cotton plant while in California. She was so impressed with the cotton that she picked about 30 pounds before she got tired of looking at it!

One of Ita's comments, with which I agreed, about the Golden Gate Bridge and Shasta Dam, was that it didn't seem humanly possible to build such structures.

It was a real pleasure to Ita accompany us on our trip. While Ita was marveling at some of the things she saw, we were learning to appreciate a little more some of the things we Americans take so much for granted. We were surprised to find that refrigerators were very scarce in the Netherlands, because the people cannot afford them, also there is very little opportunity for job changes and housing is very scarce.

Ita is on her way back to Washington, D. C. and will leave America for the Netherlands in the early part of February. She will visit a few friends on her way back, to Washington, D. C.

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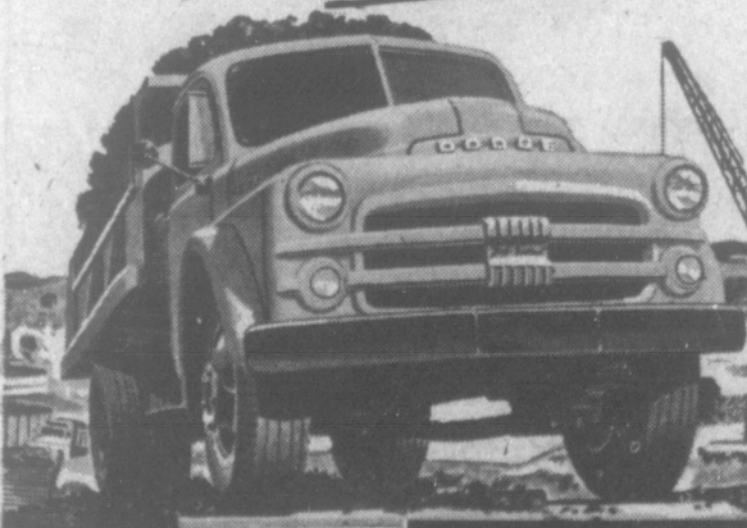
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
