ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

Rural School Board To Boost Salaries

The rural school board had its first meeting for the school year 1951-52 on Friday and re-elected officers, Herman Brelage, chairman; Cedric Cross, vice chairman; Martha Mulkey, secretary.

William McKinley of Bridge, who is a logging contractor and owns a ranch in Bridge, was appointed as a director to succeed Twila McMahon of Powers from Zone A-1.

The board agreed to add \$150 to each level on the previous salary schedule as a salary for 1952-53, as far as the equalized levy is concerned.

This will mean that school boards hiring teachers without any previous experience or with a lapse of five years or more, may expect from the equalized levy for teachers having less than 2 1/2 years education—\$2,700; for 2 1/2 years—\$2,800; 3 years—\$2,900; 3 1/2 years—\$3,000; Bachelor's Degree—

\$3,100; 4 1/2 years—\$3,200; 5 years—\$3,300; Master Degree—\$3,300. It should be borne in mind that all expenditures for 1952-53 are subject to the vote on the six percent limitation by the voters at the Annual Meeting. It should further be borne in mind that any district is permitted to vote upon itself, money to be added to that allowed by the equalized levy.

The superintendents of Empire and Powers are to be allowed \$5,100 and the county school superintendent, who acts as secretary of the rural school board, is to be allowed \$660.00 for the current year. Prior to this, the county school superintendent in Coos county has been allowed no salary other than the \$3,840 set by the state legislature.

Bernard Clark, chairman of the Audio Visual Education committee, presented the matter of the rural school board allowing 25

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cents per census child in order that film strips and slides might be placed in the office of county school superintendent so as to provide school use. The rural school board agreed and it was decided that this should be allowed in the rural school board's administrative budget, provided it was found that it could legally be done, and if not then the R. S. B. would allow this in each individual budget.

Traffic Surveys Being Made

A transportation survey is being made this week in the Myrtle

Point vicinity by Harvey Wright, director of transportation, and Paul Warfen, supervisor of transportation, each from the state department of education.

The boards included in this survey are as follows: Non High School District, Myrtle Point Union High, No. 2, Arago, No. 3, Etalaka, No. 47, Bridge, No. 77C, Myrtle Point, No. 41C.

Such surveys have been made in several counties in Oregon and in several cases, have resulted in a more economic efficient set-up. This is being made without any expense to the interested districts.
