COMBAT BADGE

With the 45th Infantry Div. in Korea—Cpt. Marvin L. Miller, son of Mr. and Mrs. Shirley R. Miller, 136 Sherwood st., Coquille, has won the Combat Infantryman Badge, symbol of the front line fighting man, while serving in Korea with the 45th Infantry Division.

The badge shows a Revolutionary War flintlock rifle mounted against a blue rectangle which is surrounded by a wreath.

The Oklahoma National Guard Division left the U. S. early in 1951 and trained extensively on the Japanese island of Hokkaido before it was committed to Korea in December.

Corporal Miller, a rifleman in Company I of the 180th Infantry Regiment, entered the Army in October 1950.

POWERS MAN TAKES PART IN KOREA

With the 1st Cavalry Div. in Japan—Cpl. Harold Smith of Powers, Oregon, is taking part in around-the-clock defensive maneuvers with the battle-toughened 1st Cavalry Division on Hokkaido, the northernmost of the Japanese home islands.

The division was rotated to Japan last December after 17 months of combat service in Korea.

Corporal Smith is now serving as a gunner in the 70th Tank Battalion's Company A. While serv-

ing in Korea, he was awarded the Purple Heart with one Oak Leaf Cluster for wounds received in action and the Korean Service Ribbon with one campaign star.

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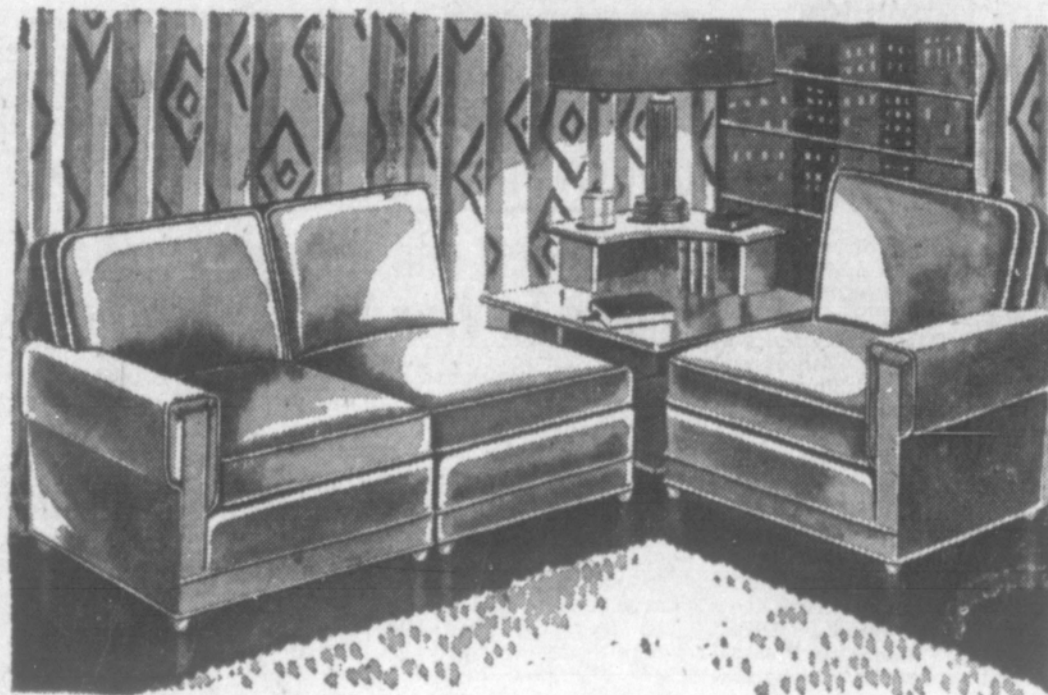
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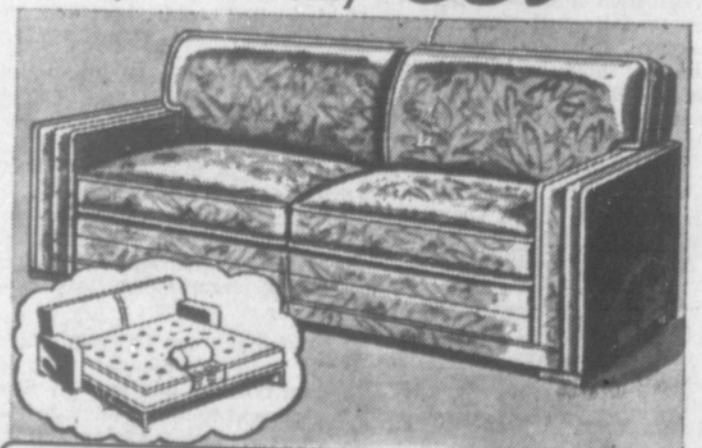
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
