## Hollenbeak Captures Audience In Lead Role of 'Heaven Can Wait,' Jr. Class Play

Jim Hollenbeak, Coquille high school junior, played his way into the hearts of a capacity audience Wednesday night in the lead role of "Heaven Can Wait," a sparkling comedy that is the junior class play.

Hollenbeak availed himself of all the qualities of the theatre as he played the role of Jo Pendleton, fighter who had been snatched into heaven too soon only to find that his body had been cremated before the mistake could be remedied.

The play produced a laugh in every line as the invisibility of the heavenly people to people of the earth brought confusion and accusations of insanity to Pendleton played by Hollenbeak who was the sole person to hear and see Mr. Jordan, portrayed excellently by John Clayton, and the heavenly messenger who had made the mistake played by Sally Jeffrey.

Ed Atkinson was the typical fight manager, Max Levine, who had been guilty of the cremation. He arranged the fight for Joe in

the body of a banker, Mr. Farnsworth, who had been murdered by his wife just as Joe was looking for a body to climb into.

The fight never came off as the wife, played expertly by Joyce Mitchell, shot her husband again and this time Joe was raced across town to be the spirit in the body of Joe Murdock, a boxer who was shot in the ring by gamblers. Joe got to the body just in time to save the fight.

The chief love interest was played by Marcia Mauney who was pleading for her husband who had been framed by the real Farnsworth. Joe falls in love with her while in the banker's body, but makes amends and he tells her to be good to this boxer, Joe Murdock.

Mr. Jordan went back to heaven after Joe was transformed into Murdock and everybody was happy but Max Levine who had lost his forty per cent.

The play was directed by Win Kelley and the stage flats were built by the stage craft crew under the direction of Paul Snider.

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## Consolidation Vote Set For March 20

A consolidation will be voted in the Myrtle Point area on Thursday, March 20. This vote will be taken for high school purposes only and will include the districts as follows: Sitkum, Dora, McKinley, and what was before the consolidation with Gravelford, known as Pleasant Hill.

In each case the vote will be taken in the schoolhouse located in the district and in all cases except the Union High school, will be held at 8:00 p. m. However, the voters in the Union High school district will ballot between 2:00 and 8:00 p. m.

The old Pleasant Hill school which has not been used for the housing of school children since 1939-40 will, in spite of the dilapidated condition of the building, be used as the voting place for the voters of former District 74, Pleasant Hill.

Anyone desiring a description of the property involved in old 74 may secure same through Martha M. Purdy, county school superintendent.
