

Bang's Disease Control Gain In Coos During Past Year, State Reports

Coos county made a substantial gain last year in its Bang's disease eradication program, cutting the incidence of this disease almost in two from the 1950 figure, the State Department of Agriculture said today.

During 1951, Bang's tests made in Coos county numbered 28,052, which is the highest number of animals tested here in the last five years and probably sets an all-time record. Exactly two per cent of the animals tested were reactors. While this percentage finds Coos county 29th on the 1951 percentage ratings of the 36 counties in Oregon, it is more significant than this standing would indicate.

This is why: In 1950, 3.83 per cent reactors were found in the 23,148 tests made here; in both

1948 and 1949, the percentage of reactors stood at 5.3 per cent (18,047 tests in 1948 and 27,975 tests in 1949); and in 1947, 3.3 per cent reactors were found in 15,951 Coos animals tested.

These figures come from M. E. Knickerbocker, chief of the division of animal industry of the state department of agriculture. (The department recently reported that for the state of Oregon the Bang's reactors in 1951 ran 1.23 per cent in the 285,714 head of cattle tested.)

Department officials point out that the effectiveness of the program in Coos county results from the cooperative effort of all agencies concerned, spark-plugged by the active attention being given by the Coos county court. The placement by the federal bureau of animal industry of Dr. Pierre P. Souaillard in Coos county to supervise the program as the local representative of the official agencies and reporting directly to the county court all problems as they arise has been and is most helpful.

The fine cooperation of Coos county officials together with the support of the dairymen has really given purpose and impetus to brucellosis control in the area. The state officials expressed hope that Coos county could soon qualify for modified certified brucellosis free area status.

Employment Levels During February

The seasonal slump in employment in Coos and Curry counties was reached the forepart of February. Since that time employment throughout the area has gradually increased.

The local employment office has found that few workers are totally separated from an employer which indicates a very small pool of available manpower for the months ahead. Some recruitment in other areas has been necessary already to fill skilled jobs where local applicants were not available.

It is estimated that 950 workers were still without work at the end of the month compared to 1260 in January. Of these 200 were women, 25 per cent of which expect to be recalled to a woodworking plant as soon as strategic materials become available. Very few job opportunities have been available for women except those skilled in office occupations.

More and more employers are hiring tested applicants through the Oregon State Employment Service. If you have not taken advantage of these free services investigate them!

Fir Peeler Logs Climb Back Up Price Ladder

Douglas fir peeler logs climbed up to the ceiling price for all grades in the Eugene area during the week ending March 8. Other forest products in the Willamette Valley were unchanged, according to the weekly farm forest products market report prepared from data supplied by the State Board of Forestry to the OSC Extension Service.

Douglas fir sawlogs were steady at ceiling prices in the Willamette valley. Second-growth sawlogs in the river at northern and central valley points were \$40 a thousand board feet for No. 3's and \$50 for

No. 2's. OPS ceilings for camp-run sawlogs are the same as No. 3's second-growth in Lane county brought \$37.50 a thousand. No. 2's were \$42.50. Camp-run sales were reported as high as \$45 for mixed second and old growth. Eight-foot logs down to 6-inch diameter were strong at \$15 to \$18 a cord or \$34 to \$40 a thousand throughout the valley.

Old-growth sawlogs in the northern and central valley were \$42.50 for No. 3's, \$52.50 for No. 2's, and \$65 for No. 1's. Lane county prices were \$37.50 for No. 3's and \$42.50 for No. 2's. Peeler logs in the Eugene area came back up to ceiling levels after several months of depressed prices. Peeler logs ranged from \$75 a thousand for No. 3's to \$100 for No. 1's. Northern and central valley prices were \$80 to \$110. One mill in the Albany area is paying \$35 a thousand for 4 1/2 foot peeler logs or multiples of 4 1/2 feet, with a minimum diameter of 30 inches.

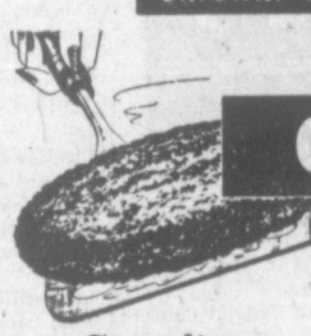
