Dewey Akers, founder and publisher of the Brookings Harbor-Pilot at Brookings, Oregon, was killed Thursday afternoon when a light plane he was a passenger in crashed into a wooded hillside near the California border.

Akers with two other Brookings men had been to Gold Beach to make arrangements for the Curry county fair and were returning home. A parked car was on the Stateside airport strip and children and people were walking on the concrete. The plane pulled out of a landing glide to circle the field in order to give the people time to get off the strip and in so doing ran into a bank of fog and crashed. The other two men were seriously injured, but not fatally so.

From All Over Coos

Coos County Fair is over for another year but quickly approaching is the great fair of the year—the State Fair. While most of you 4-Hers are now finished with your projects and hanging up your ribbons, a few of you will be preparing exhibits for display at the State Fair. Over twenty Coos County 4-Hers have qualified as champions in their class to participate in the State Fair Contest. More than sixty blue-ribbon winning exhibits from Coos County will be taken to the State Fair this year. I want to compliment all the 4-H girls that participated in the style dress review this year. All of them did a wonderful job of modeling and I'm sure the judge had a hard time picking the Queen. Nevertheless, Beverly Ganser, Norway, was chosen Queen of the Style Review. Beverly modeled the beautiful formal she had made in her 4-H sewing project. Runner up and blue-ribbon winner in her sewing division was Betty Jean Hill, Fairview. Thirty-eight girls participated in the dress review which was witnessed by well over 100 people. Winning blue ribbons in the style dress review—clothing division II were: Sally Shallenbarger, Coos Bay; Arlene Cox, Coos Bay; Roberta Reavis, Coos Bay; Torrance Berg, Bunker Hill. Modeling in clothing III and winning blue ribbons were: Nadine Bain, Bandon; Evelyn Hardman, Bridge Rt., Myrtle Point; Marlene Robinson, Myrtle Point; Sharon McFarland, Coos Bay; Helen Grant, Coquille.

Also in clothing II, under sport clothes, Sydvia Schulz, Myrtle Point was a winner. In clothing IV blue ribbon winners were Beverly Ganser, Norway; Betty Jean Hill and Barbara Horning.
The 4-H girls certainly did a good job in exhibiting and demonstrating their baking ability. The bread, loaves, muffins, cookies, and cakes were certainly enough to whet the appetite of all that observed them. In cooking III the champion of them all is Ray Panter of Riverton. In cooking II, Eva Kelton won this highest honor. The champion in the 4-H Camp Cookery division is Evelyn Hardman, Bridge while Arleta Robinson, Bridge baked the best muffins. Champion in the Vanilla drop cookie class is Roberta Reavis and in the ice box cookie class Michael Belanger, Myrtle Point walked off with this highest honor.
The 4-H agricultural and livestock club members can also be very proud of their fine exhibits and demonstrations at the fair this year. The competition, I feel, was exceptionally strong especially in showmanship and herdsmanship. The coveted herdsmanship cup award is once again in the hands of the Summer Catching Inlet Dairy Club. I know the judges had a difficult time deciding this because all the 4-H members were doing a wonderful job in the barns. The best 4-H Jersey herd display was also won by the Summer Catching Inlet Dairy Club.
