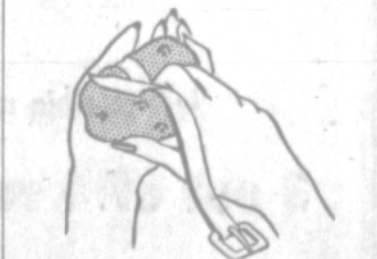

Has your club started yet?

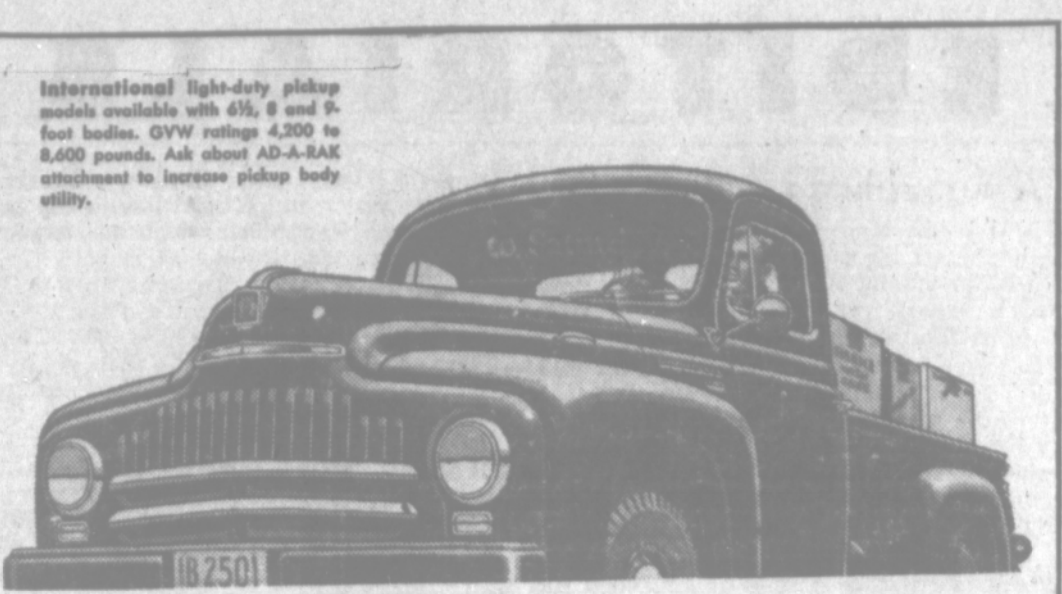
