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Community Building Committee To Request New Bond Issue Of \$55,000

A proposal was accepted at a Community Building committee meeting Monday that the members suggest to the city that the City Council advertise another bond issue for \$55,000.

This bond would be advertised with the understanding that the issue specify that \$22,500 be used for a sprinkling system; \$26,500 for concrete work in the basement and patio and \$6,000 for completion of the heating system.

The committee further decided that if the City Council refused their proposal they would turn the community building over to the city following the completion of minor projects. This would be about June 1.

The City Council was also to be notified that the walk-way on the North side of the main auditorium should be strengthened. This would enable them to make

the emergency exit safer.
