

### Chamber Favors \$55,000 Bond Issue For Community Building Completion

The Coquille Chamber of Commerce voted on Tuesday to approve the \$55,000 bond issue for the completion of the Community Building. The funds are earmarked for three major jobs: \$22,500 for a fire-protection sprinkling system; \$26,500 for completion of concrete work and the patio; and \$6,000 for completion of the heating system.

One of the points brought out by Pres Jack Bowen was that the sprinkling system will be paid for in 14 years through the saving in fire insurance.

The approval of the bond issue was reached after some considerable debate led by S. H. Peterson. Mr. Peterson was of the opinion that the chamber should vote merely to disseminate information about the issue to the general public thus assuring the city of a more representative vote. However his motion was voted down 10-6. The chamber then voted to approve the issue.

The Bonneville Power Administration line from Riddle to Norway was brought to the chamber's attention by Clarence Osika, reading letters and telegrams from Sen. Wayne Morse and Rep. Harris Ellsworth. The two men stated that they would do everything possible to restore appropriations for the line. Ellsworth wrote that though the bill had failed in the house appropriations committee, he felt sure that if the Senate restored the money provisions that he would be able to persuade the House to leave them in the final bill.

George Burr aired plans for Ben Chandler Day, scheduled for Friday.

Mayor Don Farr, speaking for the City Council, explained their stand on the street-rename issue. On Monday, the Council voted to back the issue but to leave the final decision to the voters. L. G. Sharfer suggested the possibility of having that election in conjunction with the community building bond election to be held June 12. At Mayor Farr's suggestion, Pres. Bowen appointed a committee to aid in publicizing the need for the street re-naming. Committee members are L. G. Sharfer, George Stratton and Dr. George Chaburn.

Earl Linde, chairman of the retail trades committee, reported on the Frontier Days celebration to be held in Coquille June 1 to 7. He urged members of the chamber to don Western garb and to grow beards. Emphasis of the week-long affair will be June 6. A western breakfast is planned for 9 to 11, with entertainment for children and the beard-judging contest filling in the remainder of the day. There will be a kangaroo court, Linde announced, to punish non-shavers and help provide funds for the breakfast.

Guests at the meeting were Raleigh Miller of Myrtle Point Rev. Ovid Dillingham of United Providence, L. G. Sharfer and Noel Campbell of Coquille.

### Meeting Scheduled By Committeemen

Coos County and community committeemen for the Production Marketing Administration conservation program will meet in Coquille Monday.

Purpose of the meeting is to prepare any recommendations they may have to make to the national administration and to outline their tentative Agricultural Conservation program handbook for the coming year.

A discussion of the proposed 1954 ACP plans were heard at a district PMA meeting in Roseburg Monday which was attended by E. L. Detlefsen, George Jenkins, and Warren Briggs.

Jenkins said the new program seems to be geared to the support of longtime conservation practices which will maintain fertility and production. Such practices are costly and often aren't followed unless there is financial help.

The state PMA office will give the local handbook outline its final approval.

Dwight Phipps, James Walker and Frank Hamilton, assistant state foresters, met with over 100 loggers Monday night at Myrtle Creek.

Purpose of the meeting was to acquaint the loggers with the changes in Oregon's forest laws which become effective in July.

Albert Wiesendanger, executive secretary of the Keep Oregon Green association at Salem, was also present at the meeting and showed a film, "The Enemy Is Fire."

Wiesendanger told the group that forest fire prevention means steady homes and furniture, pulpwood for paper and taxes to support schools and government.

He pointed out that protected and wisely managed forests mean all of these and more. They mean insurance for water supplies and hillsides free from erosion.

He also stressed the fact that these are but a few of the reasons why every citizen of Coos County should practice fire safety measures.
