Camp Millacoma, the lovely camp donated this spring to Girl Scouts of this area by Weyerhaeuser Timber Co., will have a capacity of approximately 50 girls. The 75x30 foot building now under construction will have a large dining hall with a fireplace, a camp store, quarters for the cook, and of course, a kitchen. Mr. Phil Writer of Coos Bay is supervising construction and among the carpenters from here who have already donated their skill are R. G. Peterson and John Dickason. Others from the Carpenter's Union plan to contribute their time and effort.

Hoyt Jersey Herd Again Gets Honor

Five registered Jersey cows owned by H. A. Hoyt, Myrtle Point, completed records on Herd Improvement Registry test which gives them to special recognition from The American Jersey Cattle Club.

The high producing animal in the group was Western Lady Bell with a mature record of 13,210 lbs. milk containing 753 lbs. butterfat. The other cows all exceeded 600 lbs. butterfat on a twice-daily-milking, 305-day mature equivalent basis.

The official HIR tests were made under the supervision of the Oregon State College with The American Jersey Cattle Club, national breed registry organization, Columbus, Ohio.
