Little is known of the power of the visiting nine, but Douglass said early this week that the Crescent City club plays in a fast northern California loop which comprises the cities of Arcata and Eureka.

The Loggers are entered in the Southern Oregon circuit which include Drain, Roseburg, Brookings, Medford, and Grants Pass. The Loggers open their loop season May 29 at Drain and in the meantime have a tentative date scheduled with North Bend May 22.

The weekend's hurling duties will be divided between Ward Rocky and Joe Michasek. Rocky will be borrowed from the Coos Bay-North Bend-Bandon Lumber-Jack-Millers for the Saturday encounter while Michasek is a Logger veteran who will start on the mound Sunday afternoon.

Other hurlers who will join the Loggers during the season, but who will not be available this weekend will be Skeets Ellis, now performing for Yale; Micky Cohan, at Wilamette; and Allen Prewett, now hurling for Bandon high school. Roy Harrington will work behind the plate Saturday night while Dick Allison will fill in at the back stop spot Sunday. Vic Backlund, Bandon high ace receiver, will take a turn as the season progresses.

Rounding out a sound infield for both encounters will be Dave Douglass at the initial sack, Chuck Humble, second base, Bill Robbitt, shortstop, and Gene McCormick, third base. Douglass has been a veteran first baseman for four years with the Loggers, Humble is in his second season while Robbitt and McCormick are newcomers. Robbitt is currently with the Hauser air force base and McCormick is head man at Sumner school.

Other infielders who will be with the Loggers later in the month will be Tex Kirkendall and Jerry Bettendorf who are now working out for Clark junior college plus Wimpy Hastings, now with the Bandon Tigers.

Outer gardening duties will be divided this weekend between Joe Marchand, Jim Newton, Don Hinchberger, and Pat Rooney. Rooney is the only newcomer and he spent last summer in the top-flight Alaska loop.

Claver Round-Up Due Again June 6

Second annual Claver Ranch Roundup will be held Sunday, June 6th, at the Diamond C. Ranch near Coquille, it was announced today by Lloyd Claver.

The ranch is located three miles north of Coquille on Shelley Road. Top cowboys from all over the state will compete in the various events, including bronc riding, calf roping, team roping, steer stopping and wild cow milking.

Claver said this will be an old-fashioned jackpot ranch roundup, with no fancy stadium trimmings. Logs will be dragged to the corral fences for spectators to sit on while enjoying the rodeo. Wild horses will be saddled right out in the middle of the arena, and then turned loose with a cowboy doing his best to stay in the saddle.

The steers, calves and wild cows will be rounded up on the Claver Ranch, and the wild horses will be furnished by the McCall Ranch on Catching Creek. The general public is invited to attend, Claver said.

Men Of The State Make Fishing Treks For First Day Of Season, May First

Fishermen! Some 300,000 of them took to the lakes and streams as trout season in Oregon opened for 1954.

Unlike recent years, the whole state opened at one time with the exception of most of the lakes, reservoirs, and their tributaries within the national forest boundaries in the Cascade mountains. These bodies of water will be open for trout fishing from May 29 to October 10.

Some misunderstanding has arisen regarding East and Paulina lakes in the Newberry crater southeast of Bend. This area is considered in the province of the Cascade mountains, and since they are in the Deschutes national forest, the lakes do not open until the 29th of May.

However, some other lakes in the Deschutes forest did open on May 1. They are Suttle, Blue, Crescent, and Odell lakes and Wickiup and Rock Creek reservoirs.

Elsewhere in the state many lakes and reservoirs are open, but Elk lake and Crane Prairie reservoir in Deschutes county are not open until May 29.

There are specific limitations on some of the waters in the state, and fishermen should consult the synopsis of Oregon angling regulations for 1954 when in doubt. These booklets are available at game commission license agencies and also at game commission regional offices and headquarters in Portland.

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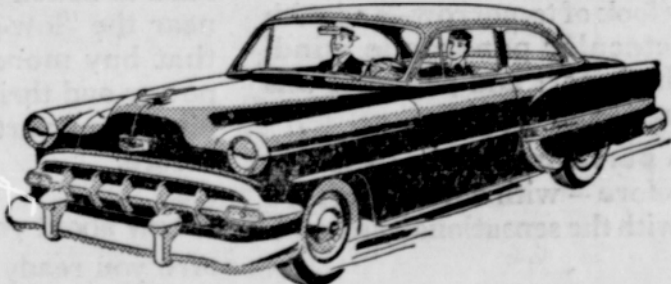
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
