Sponsored by the Coquille Rotary club, the Don Cossacks are one of the most famous of Russian dance and singing groups. Made up of all-American citizens, the Don Cossacks portray the dances and music of their old country before Communism took over.

### Coos Farm Bureau To Elect Officers

At last week's meeting of the Coos County Farm Bureau, Frank Rood, Jr., president, announced that the new officers will be elected at the annual county-wide meeting scheduled for October 24 at the Parkersburg school playshed. The election will be preceded by a noon potluck dinner.

The entire memberships from Coos Bay, Coquille, Myrtle Point and Bandon Farm Bureau Centers are invited to attend and bring their families and friends.

Wayne Watson, Coos County Farm Bureau livestock marketing manager and chairman reported that over 1,000 head of livestock weighing over 3/4 million pounds has been marketed in California so far this year. In order to facilitate finding the loading area, the members voted to place a sign at the Watson ranch reading, "Southern Oregon Farm Bureau Marketing Association—Shipments Friday."

The members also okeed three resolutions made by the Coos FB centers. They are: 1. Property ownership be re-instated as one of the qualifications for persons voting on bond issues. 2. All elections involving questions of levying taxes or issuing public bonds be held the second Friday in May or the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November. 3. The county be responsible to the state only for its proportionate share of taxes collected.

Following the county-wide meeting, the resolutions will be presented to the state Farm Bureau Resolutions committee for action at the annual state convention. The conclave will be held November 17-21 at Medford.

Ben Robinson, president of the State Farm Bureau Federation has named Frank Rood, Jr. and Mrs. John Devereux to represent Coos county on the state resolutions committee at the convention.

### Larger Planer To Be Opened Near City Limits

A new planer mill and reload with 1,000 feet of siding is now in the process of construction on the Myrtle Point highway just East of the Coos Bay Lumber plant.


