Extension Units Schedule Project On Making Slacks

"Better Fitting Slacks" is the theme of the 25 Home Extension Units in Coos County this month. A three day workshop is being held for project leaders in slack making in the Conference Room of the Extension Office in the Court house in Coquille. Miss Emma Lou Webster, County Extension Agent in Home Economics is in charge of the workshop.

Two project leaders from each of the 25 units will meet with Miss Webster one day a week for three weeks to receive instructions in altering slack patterns and various techniques having to do with pockets and plackets.

Six or seven unit project leaders will meet each day and then return to their communities and hold similar workshops for unit members and others who are interested in better fitting slacks.

Anyone is eligible to take part in the workshop as there are no pre-requisites to the course. All kinds of material—wool, rayon, denims and blends—will be used and all types of patterns are permissible.
