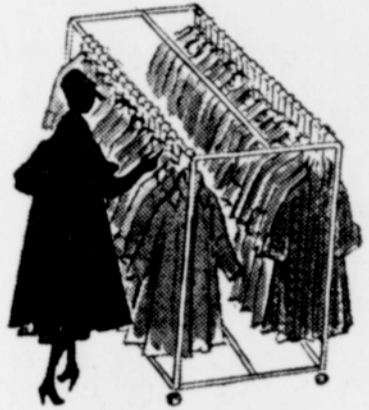

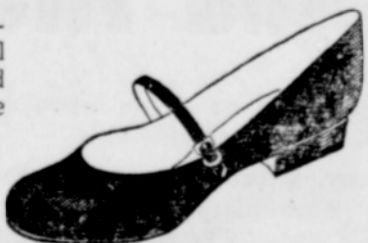

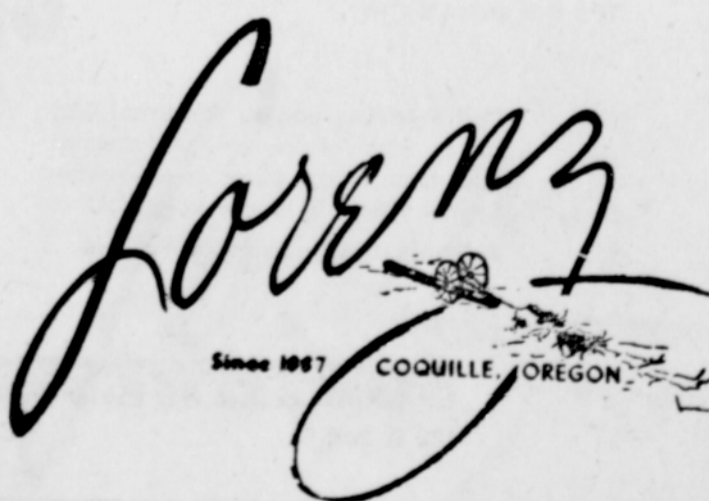

The new year will see abundant supplies of high quality eggs available to consumers at very favorable prices, according to Walt Schroeder, county extension agent.

Production during December and January is expected to reach an all time record for these months, assuring consumers plenty of high quality, fresh eggs of all sizes during "January Egg Month," continued Schroeder.

Miss Emma Lou Webster, home extension agent, added that eggs are a favorite, health giving and versatile food, desirable as the main course item for breakfast, lunch or suppers, and indispensable in baking, the making of desserts, and in the preparation of many nourishing beverages.

The 1954 production of eggs adds up to approximately 412 eggs for every man, woman and child in the country or about 34 dozen per capita.

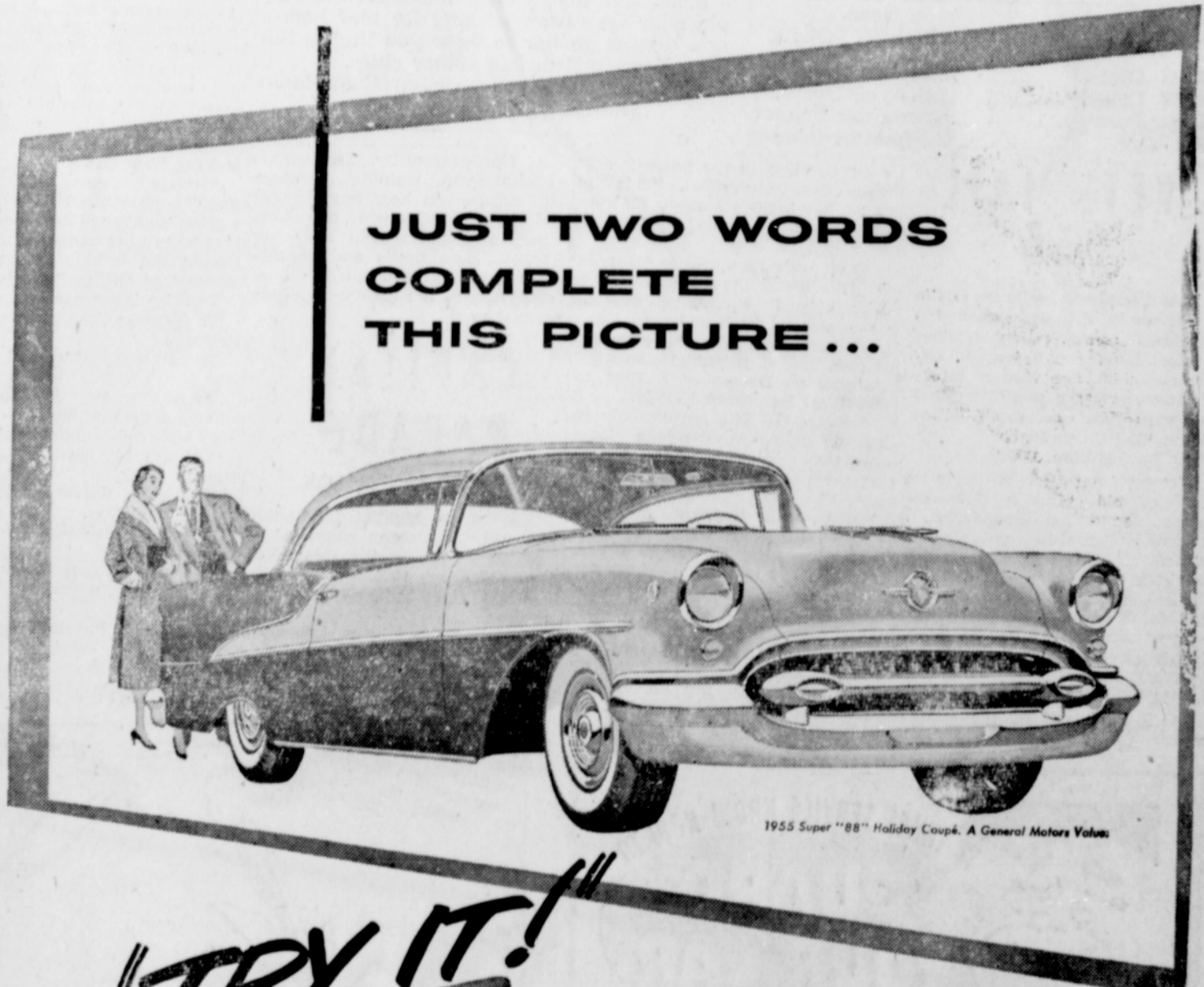
