CIRCUIT COURT

Willie Wheeler has filed an action at law against George S. Lamm seeking judgment of \$35,000 general damages and \$1,082.85 special damages for injuries he received when the motor vehicle the defendant was driving collided with the car in which the plaintiff was a passenger.

Richard P. Joslin has filed a complaint against Stanley R. Smith seeking judgment of \$285.72 for damages to the plaintiff's car which was involved in a collision with the motor vehicle driven by the defendant.

Lillian Farley, administratrix for the estate of Charles Henry Swan, deceased has filed a complaint against Edward R. Barr seeking judgment of \$20,000 for injuries received by the deceased Charles Henry Swan which the plaintiff alleges were the direct cause of his death. The defendant

struck the deceased with his logging truck on July 30, 1954 as he was crossing the extreme southwestern end of the Fat Elk bridge.

Clarence Hand has filed a complaint against the State Industrial Accident Commission of the State of Oregon seeking a judgment order of the court referring his former claim for compensation back to the defendant Commission and ordering said defendant to enter an order modifying its former orders and awards of compensation granting the plaintiff compensation for permanent partial disability equal to 90 per cent loss of function of a hand plus costs. The plaintiff was injured on or about January 16, 1954 while employed by Coos Bay Timber Operators as a sawyer.

Cape Arago Lumber Company, a corporation has filed a complaint against T. H. Benham seeking payment of \$1,284.13 plus interest which the plaintiff loaned to the defendant on or about June 29, 1953.

Edmund E. Buffum and Pacific National Fire Insurance Company have filed a complaint against Ray Carrow and Howard Cooper Corporation seeking judgment

against each in the sum of \$720 for plaintiff Buffum and \$936.70 for plaintiff Pacific National Fire Insurance Company. Marvin Shearer, irrigation specialist, will lead off with the importance of using the right amount of water. What is field capacity, over-irrigation, and under-irrigation and suggestions on timing water applications will be part of his discussion, Thienes said.

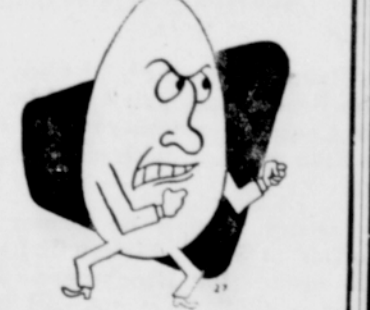
Coquille Postoffice Has Gain In 1954

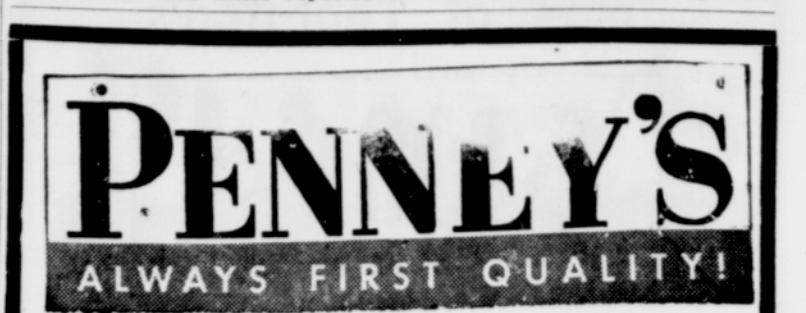

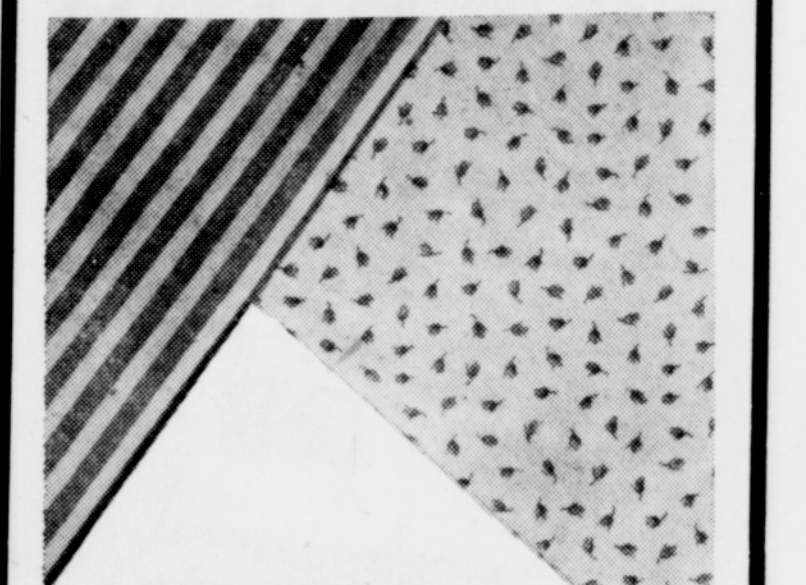
