Shorthanded Skywatch Keeps Constant Vigil For Aircraft

It's not hard to become a Skywatcher. All it requires is a little time, normal sight and hearing.

Coquille's Skywatch post is considered one of the key posts in the perimeter area of the air defense system and as such, is the post which alerts some 19 other Skywatch units in this area.

Even so, many of the shifts remain unfilled and the hard-working supervisor, Mrs. Margaret Holton, spends many of her free hours scanning the skies because no one else seems to want to do it.

Coquille's Skywatch post observed its second birthday last Thursday (July 14) by being put on a regional exercise alert. Thus, human eyes and ears are added to the radar defense system to make sure that no unreported or unfriendly planes reach our nation.

In addition to this valuable work, the Skywatch has more than proved its worth by spotting civilian planes which were off-course, on fire or being forced down somewhere.

Supplementing the work of adult members of the Skywatch is the Teen-Agers club headed by President Alice Campbell and aided by the club counsellor, E. C. Aumiller. The group has been one of the most active such clubs in the state and it now ranks about third in activity.

Duties of a person on Skywatch include observing, evaluating and reporting all planes in this area. The average shift is only four hours.

Girl Scouts Plan Annual Day Camp At Patterson Grove August 1 To 5

Patterson Grove will be the site of the annual Day Camp planned by the Coquille Girl Scout Association Monday through Friday, August 1 to 5.

The sessions are open to Brownie and non-scouts alike between the ages of 7 and 11 or to those who have finished the first and fourth grades inclusive.

The day will begin at 9:45 and will feature outdoor living, cooking, games, singing, folk dancing, crafts and nature study. During the camp girls will learn conservation and correct fire building as well as how to enjoy the beauty of nature.

Camp will close at 3 p. m. each day. Campers will be served milk at noon and each unit will be allowed two noontime cookouts. The rest of the time sack lunches should be brought from home.

Each girl will need a bowl and

spoon, marked with her name, for her cookout meals. Dress for the session will be jeans or pedal pushers and each girl should bring a sweater and bandana for the foggy mornings.

Sponsoring the Day Camp this year is the Coquille Women's club and a large turnout of girls is expected. Complete insurance coverage is provided by the scout association and the camp will be run according to National Girl Scout Day Camp standards. A nurse will be on duty at each session.

Registration forms are now in the mail and will be published in the Sentinel this week and next week. Each girl attending must bring a registration slip with either parent's or guardian's signature on the first day of camp. Registration fee, which includes the cost of insurance, food and craft supplies is \$1.25.

Douglas Fir Shipments Up During June

PORTLAND, OREGON—(Special)—Douglas fir lumber shipments, orders and production figures for June were released today by Harris E. Smith, secretary of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association.

The weekly average of West

Coast lumber production in June was 188,568,000 b. f. or 100.6 percent of the 1950-1954 average. Orders averaged 199,844,000 b. f.; Shipments 204,968,000 b. f.; Weekly averages for May were: Production, 189,805,000 b. f.; 101.3 percent of the 1950-1954 average; Orders 187,753,000 b. f.; Shipments, 192,108,000 b. f.

Six months of 1955 cumulative production, 5,057,157,000 b. f.; Six months of 1954, 4,795,305,000 b. f.; Six months of 1953, 5,181,817,000 b. f.

Orders for six months of 1955 break down as follows: Rail and Truck 3,777,346,000 b. f.; Domestic Cargo 1,011,511,000 b. f.; Export 136,977,000 b. f.; Local 190,869,000 b. f.

The industry's unfilled order file stood at 831,915,000 b. f. at the end of June, gross stocks at 886,458,000 b. f.
