Covered Stands Fall Prospect

Covered stands, built by the Coquille Lions club, will very likely greet football fans at the first home game of the Red Devils this fall.

The school board granted the Lions permission to build the stands at its meeting last Thursday (July 14.) The plans, as presented to the school board, call for 12 rows of seats to hold about 900 persons. The stands will be 126 feet long and completely covered.

One feature of the grandstand is that there will be only two posts which could block spectators' views. Cost of the stand is estimated at about \$5,000. Work on the stands will begin as soon as possible.

The new grandstand will rise where the present bleachers are now located on the high school field. The bleachers will probably be re-erected across the field.
