Coquille Scores 20-0 Victory At Douglas As Red Devils Continue Winning Ways

Coquille's Red Devils were just too much for the Douglas Trojans in a Friday afternoon game on the Douglas field which saw Coquille come out with a 20-0 victory.

Although the Trojans pressed to the Devils' 15 three times, once on a recovered fumble at the end of the game, Spike Leslie's boys held the Winston school scoreless.

Coquille struck for pay-dirt twice in the second quarter and once in the final frame as the Devils racked up 14 downs to three for Douglas.

Halfback Les Hubbard gave the Trojans the most trouble individually. He was responsible for 140 of the yards gained by the Devils and scored one TD.

Tom Creager was the first to cross the goal line for Coquille on a two-yard quarterback sneak from the two. The score was the climax of a 58-yard drive by the

Devils in the district A-2 encounter. Jack Liles' kick went wide of the mark.

The score was set up by two long running plays and a 14-yard pass play.

With only 2 and one-half minutes remaining in the first half, Gene Simpson intercepted a Troy pass on Douglas' 16. Three plays later, Duane Sherwood went through the middle to score. Liles' kick was good to make it Coquille 13, Douglas 0 at half.

Hubbard's scoring chance came at the end of a 35-yard drive when he plunged across from the two, eight plays after the quarter started. Liles' kick was good.

The Trojans recovered a Coquille fumble in the closing seconds of the game, but time was against them, as the final score stood Coquille 20, Douglas 0.

Ducks-Bear Gridiron Clash Top Fare Saturday On Multnomah Stadium Field

University of Oregon, Eugene—(Special)—One of the closest and most hotly contested inter-school rivalries on the Pacific Coast will boil anew in Portland next Saturday when Oregon's Ducks take on California's Golden Bears in a Multnomah stadium contest.

Oregon with George Shaw beat California with Paul Larson a year ago in Memorial stadium at Berkeley, 33-27, in a real thriller. The series between these two clubs dates back to 1899 when the

Bears dumped Oregon 12-0. But the real rivalry started in 1941 when Oregon ached the Californians 10-7. Since then it has been a nip-and-tuck battle each year. California holds the edge from the 1941 game, in the series, 5-4 with one tie. That one tie came in 1953 when Len Casanova's Webfoots held the Bears to a 0-0 stalemate.

A year ago California scored 14 points in the initial period, only to go scoreless in the second and third and then come back with 13
